The total price is due after the final bid and payable on delivery. Late payment of the invoice will incur interest at bank rate. Adjudication ensues after the highest bid has been called three times, and commits the bidder to accept the coins. Written bids have preference over room bids. The buyer cannot claim to act on behalf of a third person. All identifications of the items sold in this catalogue are statements of opinion and made in good faith.

The authenticity of the coins is unconditionally guaranteed, without time limit.

The coins will be dispatched by registered and insured mail for the account and the risk of the purchaser. The purchaser is responsible for any dues or taxes outside of Switzerland and is advised to acquaint himself with the formalities. The auctioneer cannot be responsible for contraventions. The auction is held in Zurich and any legal questions arising shall be determined in Zurich. A buyer consigning commissions or executing room bids acknowledges the acceptance of the above conditions. 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#### **Foreword**

It may be confidently stated that this collection represents the most impressive and complete array of coinage from Magna Graecia and Sicily ever brought to public auction. Comprising more than five hundred coins, this sale is so far unsurpassed in numismatic history.

The collection was begun with uncommon sensitivity and passion by a Swiss collector, *doctor honoris causa*. With his wife's enthusiastic assistance, it grew over a period of 50 years, from 1940 to 1993. The collection has been honoured by being put on public display for a decade at the Antikenmuseum Basel und Sammlung Ludwig (catalogued in *Griechische Münzen aus Grossgriechland und Sizilien* by H.A. Cahn, L. Mildenberg, R. Russo, H. Voegtli, Basel 1988, ). While substantial in and of itself, the collection is in reality the tip of an iceberg, representing a vaster collection comprising coins sold to date by Numismatica Ars Classica (or its associates), and others that will be sold in years to come.

Although operated as a business, Numismatica Ars Classica could not countenance the dispersal of such a culturally significant collection without observing the utmost respect for its owner's desire for proper restraint and reserve on the one hand, and academic requests on the other. In deference to its inestimable geographical and historic significance among private and publicly owned collections, Numismatica Ars Classica has assumed a pledge to oversee the complete publication of this unique and intriguing collection over the coming years.

The most striking characteristics of this collection are its clear human touch, and completeness: no period, type of metal, or weight fraction gains undue prominence at the expense of the others. With meticulous evenhandedness, our collector has eschewed long series of coins originating from the same die-pair, all the same taking into account every noteworthy variant within each single issue.

Besides bearing the unmistakable hallmark of its owner, a great collection also reflects the work, the taste, and the spirit of the various advisers who nurtured its growth. The international roll-call of illustrious numismatic names that have supported our Swiss collector in this unique and unrepeatable endeavour runs from Jacob Hirsch to Hubert Herzfelder, from Pierre Strauss to Herbert Cahn, Silvia Hurter, Leo Mildenberg, Mario Ratto, Carlo Crippa, Emile Bourgey, Giorgio Fallani, George Muller, and many others. In truth, I also feel obliged to count myself among this numerous group: twenty years' acquaintance with the eminent collector has developed from a business relationship into an integral part of my life.

In an age where the archetype of the true collector appears to have been superseded by that of the "gatherer", he was convinced that ample available funds are not of themselves sufficient to transform an individual into a discerning collector: in his view, the crucial attributes are broad-mindedness, and enlightened learning. These traits are evidenced by desire on the one hand to include the most beautiful existing specimen in the collection, yet when this was not possible (as in the case of the drachm of Pandosia), deference to the highest principals of completeness and documentation meant that one was also content with a poor specimen.

In conclusion, I would like to mention the way that this house has, over the years, been a crossroads for all those with a studious interest in the coinage of Magna Graecia and Sicily. Examining the collection is an inevitable task for those about to publish any new work (it will suffice to note the recurring references to "Swiss private collection" or "Antike Museum Basel" in recent publications). The way in which the collector has placed his wisdom at our disposal goes far beyond normal expectations, and his eager volunteering of encouragement of every kind has been an object-lesson that will not be forgotten.

Extremely rare. Insignificant die break on obverse, lightly toned and about extremely fine 25%

The coin shows on the obverse a Gorgon running to left, framed within a circle of dots. Likewise, a wheel within another circle of dots appears on the reverse. A variant of the silver issue shows alphabetic letters inserted between the spokes of the wheel, forming the name of an otherwise unknown city, Thezy or Thezle. The Gorgon wears a thin *chiton* that wrinkles with aerial lightness around her body and enhances its form, and runs on her knees holding two snakes in her outstretched hands. The calligraphic effect on the large spread wings is remarkable, with the development of feathers and remiges. The Gorgon's head is typical, with wide-open mouth, broad, flat cheeks and snub nose. The Gorgon motif belongs to a long and frequent tradition of running figures appearing on Greek coins, starting with that of Nike. The archaic features of the figurative type of the Gorgon portrayed here is a pendant to the antefixes of Capua and Cumae. Pertaining to the same class of "motion", and similarly archaic and consistent from the thematic point of view, is the wheel of the reverse, with hub and two semicircular spokes.

Of the highest rarity, only the fourth specimen known. Some light corrosion, otherwise good very fine

The coin, worth five units, shows a plain reverse without type and, therefore, the figuration is all concentrated on the obverse. Appearing here, well in the centre of a dotted circular frame, is the head of some kind of leonine monster turning to right. It immediately brings to mind the chimera archetype so widespread in Etruscan iconography, the most famous representation of which is doubtless the bronze statue with dedicatory inscription of Tinia (=Zeus by the Etruscan), originating from Arezzo and housed at present in the Museo Archeologico, Florence. From the mythological point of view, it is worth remembering that the Chimera (literally: "goat") was a monster with a lion's head and body, sometimes winged, with its tail in the form of a snake and a goat's head in the middle of the back. It belched blazing fire and was killed by Bellerophon, riding his pegasus.

The reverse of this extremely rare coin, of which only three other specimens (all in museum collections) are known, has a smooth surface, while the obverse shows a Roman jug supported on a tripod, from whose opening emerges an octopus with branched tentacles. The fresh, naturalistic design linked to the representation of an octopus is no surprise if one considers that Populonia (in Etruscan *Pupluna*, going further back to the more antique form *Fufluna*, in connection with the god *Fufluns*) was situated by the sea opposite the island of Elba. Having more recent foundations than other Etruscan cities, it was the centre of an iron industry which worked the ore that was extracted from Elba. Populonia was still flourishing in the III and II centuries B.C., as attested by the rich local mintage. The octopus might have been captured at Populonia using the same technique related in the III century A.D. by Oppian in his *Helieutica* ("Fishing"), a Greek didactic poem. This describes the capture of the cephalopod that, prey to its reproductive instincts, mistakes the branches of an olive tree lowered by fishermen into the sea for the tentacles of a female: "For they bind together branches of the olive as goodly as may be and put lead in their midst, and tow them from the boat. The Poulpe, on noticing it, is not unheeding but instead rushes to embrace his comrades. And not even as he is being hauled towards capture does he relax the bond of desire, till he is within the boat, nor even while he perishes does he hate the olive" (cf. *Hal.* IV 301-307).

Extremely rare, only seven specimens known. About extremely fine 5'000

The obverse of the coin is filled by an amphora framed in an outer circle, with an *octopus* winding its tentacles around the body of the jug. The octopus motif, here captured in the moment it projects itself vigorously from the opening of the vase, is a recurring one in the mintage of Populonia, a maritime city that, like numerous others (Taras, Croton, Syracuse, Poseidonia in Ital, Eretria and Argos Amphilocicum in the Aegean world), expressly referred to this cephalopod. Greek opinion was divided as to the creature's intelligence. In the "Historia animalium" Aristotle (384-322 B.C.) dubs it anoetos ("devoid ofesens") insofaras it could be lured by something as simple as an outstretched hand trailing in the water (cf. Hist. anim. 622 a 3-4): the octopus has rather a good brain, but does not need to think (the ancients thought that the brain, far from being the centre of rational and sensual faculties, acted as a kind of "radiator", conceived as an organ needed to reduce body temperature.

Of the highest rarity, only two examples known. Oxidation on reverse, otherwise good very fine 4'000

This coin is extremely rare; only one other specimen is known (Jameson 23). This coin was struck in the crucial years of the second Punic war, between 217 and 215 B.C. On this subject we know that the Etruscans remained loyal to Rome in 217 (the dreadful year of the defeat of consul C. Flaminius Nepos on the shores of lake Trasimeno at the hands of Hannibal), just as the great Carthaginian general was doing his best to convince them to join his side. Only in later years, in 208 as we learn from Titus Livius (XXVII 24, 1-9), did an uprising take place in Arezzo, spreading afterwards to the whole of Etruria and Umbria.

In ancient Italy, the Gorgoneion finds artistic manifestations mainly in the coroplastic, in the antefixes of the temple of portonaccio at Veii and in those of southern Italy, specifically at Taranto. It is well known that the terrifying appearance of the Gorgons (monsters confined to the extreme west, close to the Hesperides and the kingdom of the dead) underwent progressive development aimed at softening its mask into a more humanised appearance.

The 50-asses belongs to a well defined group of Populonian gold coins, some thirty specimens having been studied by Laura Breglia. The obverse portrays a lion's head to right. The chronology of this group has generated considerable disagreement and debates among scholars.

According to Breglia's account, it can be summarised thus:

High chronology: second half VI-half of V (the chronology of the early publishers, Gamurrini, Garrucci, Sambon and, as of late, Breglia). b) Middle chronology: IV century represented by Cesano and, to a certain extent, by Jenkins.

c) Low chronology: III century, proposed by Thomsen (and seconded by P. Marchetti), which ties the aurei to sestertiarius gold he dates to 212 B.C. for the first issue.

A gold piece with the lion's head and the mark of value of 100 units, studied by S. Grande, has given rise to much controversy and doubts as to its authenticity.

The whereabouts of the mint that produced this coin remains the subject of much debated. Contemporary scholars are more inclined towards The whereabouts of the mint that produced this coin remains the subject of much debated. Contemporary scholars are more inclined towards Tuscany, in the valley of the Clanis (Chiana), to be exact. The city of Arettinu (Arezzo) was situated on the valley slopes, in the NE part of Etruria. The obverse shows a Negroid male head to right, to reverse an elephant, also turned to right. Historically, this dates the coin between the years 208-207 B.C., during the second Punic war. The great Titus Livius attests in his history of Rome Ab Urbe Condita (XXVII 21, 6) that an uprising took place in Etruria, headed by the Aretini. Arezzo subsequently played an important role in the Hannibalic war by supplying Scipio's African expedition with a large quantity of bronze weapons: "The people of Etruria were the first to promise that they would help the consul, each according to his own possibilities: [...] The Aretini three thousand shields, as many helmets, javelins, lances, stakes, making a total of 50'000, with the same quantities of all kinds; axes, spades, scythes, millstones, everything necessary to provision 40 warships, 120,000 bushels of wheat. They would likewise have supplied decurions and rowers, and covered the expenses of the voyage." (Liv. XXVIII 45, 18-17). 45, 18-17).

Around the mid fourth century B.C., Etruscan rule in Campania was challenged by the first attack of Samnite tribes, who swarmed down

from the mountains and advanced over the Campanian plain, at that time occupied by the Aurunci. This resulted in a considerable mixing of population; the vanquishers and the vanquished rapidly assimilated into one people. As "denizens of the plain", as opposed to the Samnites who were "denizens of the mountains", they became known as the Campani. The chronological source represented by Diodorus Siculus sets these events under the rule of Theodorus in 438 or 445 B.C., Titus Livius in 421 B.C., and under the consulship of C. Sempronius Atratinus and Q. Fabius Vibolanus. Exact details of the conquest are unknown, but it seems that Capua was the first to fall, followed by Cumae in 421 and perhaps Dicaerchia (=Pozzuoli). From Strabo (V 4, 4, C 243) we learn that "later, when the Campani became established as masters of the city (Cumae), they committed numerous outrages against the population in general, and, what is more, cohabited with the wives of the citizens". This didrachm, struck during the years 415-400, bears a female head (nymph), head to right on the obverse, hair bound with a ribbon. and a bearded man-headed bull advancing r., with a snake between his legs.

Rutter has observed that "unlike the Hyrians, who remained a people without a city-site, the Campani can be located in a well-known Campanian city". This is also supported by a passage from Polybius, who describes Capua and its surroundings. He has tried hard to identify this city with Capua, because "Campania" in the fifth century implied the inland cities; it was only in the second century that the name Campania became associated with the coastal region. Rutter therefore asserts,: "I suggest that the name Campani referred in the fifth century to the people of Capua and its immediate neighbourhood, and only later acquired a wider geographical connotation". Within the limits of the two groups into which Campanian coins are divided, our nomos pertains to the II group, distinguished by the head of Athena to r., wearing an Attic helmet with crest and olive wreath. This reverse is taken up by the usual man-faced bull. From a typological point of view, the head of the goddess is similar to the one appearing in the mintage of Thurium. Stylistic comparison can be established with issues from Naples, which, according to Rutter, became the sole mint after 420, common to all Campanian cities.

Coins are the only evidence for people of this name. Four obverse dies are linked with Nola, two with the Fenserni, and one recut for Neapolis. The obverse die of our coin, with its suggestive head of Hera Licinia, is used both for the Fenserni issue and, intriguingly enough in a unique instance, for Thurium, SNG Cop. 1431, suggesting that Italic tribes and Italiate cities were to some degree allied under the protective power of Hera against still-hostile groupings. Since the city is known to have been an aggressive defender of Greek interests, the extreme rarity of the type at Thurium may indicate a rather tentative diplomacy.

Dating from the late sixth century, this nomos shows Phalantus naked, riding a dolphin, expressing a motif destined for popular success in the coins of Taras: the dolphin brings Phalantus safe and sound across the sea (also evidenced by the presence of a pecten in the lower field of the coin), and conveys him to Italy, according to the dictate of the Delphic oracle. We learn from the *Periegesis of Greece* of Pausania (II cent. A.D.) that statues of Taras, Phalantus, and Phalantus' dolphin (cf. Paus. X 13) were among the votive offerings (*anathemata*) presented to Delphi by the Tarantines with a fifth of the spoils taken from the Peucetii and the lapygians. The familiar figure of Phalanthus with outstretched arms, riding naked on a dolphin in mid-ocean, refers to the traditions about the origin of Taras. Phalantus, leader of the Partenii, arrived from Laconia at the city already founded by Taras, *Neptuni filius* (cf. Servius *ad Aen*. III 551), and enlarged it while keeping its ancient name. Events concerning the founding of Taras are recorded by the geographer of the Augustan age, Strabo (VI 3, 2-3), who retells and elaborates on accounts originating from Antiochus (fr. 13 Jacoby) and Ephorus (fr. 216 Jacoby), with hints at the barbarian and Greek populations subsumed by the new settlers sent by Sparta. The pre-Laconian element, i.e. the Cretan one, is apparently alluded to by the reverse of our coin, with its representation of a nymph's head: most likely that of Satyra, daughter of Minos, king of Crete.

According to Antiochus' account, one of two gathered by Strabo (together with that of Ephorus), at the time of the Messenian war (dated at the second half of the VIII century B.C.), those among the Lacedaemonians who did not take part in the expeditionary force were declared slaves and named Helots. All children born during the expedition were called *Parthenae* and stripped of their political rights. However, they did not accept their fate and chose one of their number, Phalanthus, as leader. They plotted a mutiny against the Spartiathes, timed for the Spartiathe festivity of the Hyacinthiae (in honour of Hyachinthos, in the shrine of Apollo Amicleus). Phalanthus was to signal the revolt by putting a leather cap on his head. But the Spartiathes learned of the scheme, and the herald forbade him to wear the hat. Their conspiracy uncovered, the *Parthenae* fled, headed by Phalanthus and, in compliance with the orders of the Delphian oracle, set forth to find the settlement of Taras. Our coin offers an intriguing detail by including a purple-shell instead of the usual *pecten* as part of the marine scenery surrounding Phalanthus' crossing on a dolphin's back. In antiquity, Taras renowned for the production of the very valuable dye, with iridescent-shades, which has left an echo even in Horace (*Epist.* II 1, 207): *Lana Tarentino violas imitata veneno* ("The wools that, with the dyes of Taras, reproduce the colour of violets").

Apart from the usual obverse with the naked figure of Phalanthus astride a dolphin, it is worth calling attention to the reverse of the coin, taken up by the head of the nymph Satyra. The nymph's presence may well refer not only to pre-Laconian origins (Satyra, daughter of Minos, met Poseidon and bore his son Taras, eponymous of the city), but also to the "new settlement" founded by Phalanthus and the *Parthenae*. *Satyrion* appears in the text of the Delphian oracle reported by Antiochus (*apud* Strab. VI 3,2): "I give to thee Satyrium, both to take up thine abode in the rich land of Taras and to become a bane to the Iapygians". So the *Parthenae* first settled in Satyrion (name derived from the nymph Satyra), the modern Saturo, on the S.E. coast of Leporano, which recent findings seem to confirm as the oldest Laconian site in Apulia. Moving on to the olive motif, the botanist Theophrastus, successor to Aristotle at the head of the Peripatetic School, notes: "Around Taras the olives always bear much fruit, but most of it perishes at the time when the blossom falls" (cf. Thephr., *Hist. plant. Iv 19*,9).

There is a lingering sentimental belief that the initial  $\Phi$ I and K, likewise KAA and A(PI) elsewhere in the period, represent master die-cutters. The hypothesis is bolstered by other ambitious types, probably crafted by the same engraver(s). Regrettably, the letter groups  $\Phi$ I, KAA, API etc., so often interpreted as artists' signatures, belonged in reality to functionaries of the Italiate League, and are found in some form all over southern Italy during this period of war waged by Alexander of Epirud. We must concur with Jenkins as he produces yet more evidence to destroy the aesthetic theory, "I think all the names are officials".

The date of this gold stater is debatable: Vlasto and Kraay suggested the years between 340-334; however, it was generally thought to have have been issued between 334-330, but now, a new theory by W. Fischer-Bossert fixes the date of issue between 325-320. The first dates refer to Archidamus III, king of Sparta, son and successor to Aegesilaus who fell in the battle of Manduria in Italy while aiding

the Tarantines. The second date refers to Alexander of Epiros, king of the Molossian. Called to the aid of Tarentum around 334-333, he

vanquished most of southern Italy. He was allied to Rome, but was subsequently defeated and killed at Pandosia in 331-330.

The obverse of the coin shows a delightful portrait of the goddess Persephone (daughter of Zeus and Demeter, the goddess of the underworld and Hades' companion) wearing a diadem, a light veil, earring, and a pearl necklace. It is well known that Hades, Zeus' brother, fell in love with his niece, the "girl" (Kore), and abducted her while she gathering flowers with other nymphs on the plain of Enna in Sicily. The people of Taras were devoted worshippers of the goddess: the famous "Goddess on the Throne" of Berlin, which was found hidden in an ancient well, belongs to a temple dedicated to Kore-Persephone. In Pizzone there is a sanctuary to the goddess where thousands of clay effigies of the goddess were found. Another divinity, this time a god, is on the reverse of the coin: Poseidon.

J. Liegle interprets the figure in front of Poseidon as the young boy Taras (the son of Poseidon and the nymph Satyra) who begs his father,

the god, for the bow which lies in his lap.

The dating of this splendid gold stater has been subject to debate, but is now thought in all likelihood to be later than 302 (rather than 315 B.C., as first believed). This controversy notwithstanding, its historical and artistic significance are beyond doubt. The rare gold mintage of the time is consistent with an increased need to renew and increase the number of coins issued, not least as a means of paying the mercenaries hired to meet the growing domestic threat from non-Greek tribes. In 303 or 302, the Lucans tried to obtain the alliance of Rome against Taras. For the third time, Taras had turned to Greece for assistance. The call was heeded by Sparta, the Tarentine motherland (Taras was founded around 700 B.C. by Spartan refugees called *Partheniae*, i.e. "children of the virgins".) The royal prince Cleonimos, second son of Cleonimos II, was despatched along with some 20,000 mercenaries, and the arrival of this large contingent persuaded the Romans to make peace with the Tarentines. The successful outcome, sealed by the conquest of Metapontum, is comemorated in this coin, its obverse and reverse both steeped in overt religious significance: the head of Persephone on the obverse, and the Dioscuri riding at speed across the reverse. The Dioscuri, namely Castor and Pollux or the "sons of Zeus" (and Leda), were typical Doric deities worshipped throughout Peloponnesus. They are represented here in accordance with the usual archaic iconography (also attested by black figure ceramics), including the wreath and palm frond, both unmistakable symbols of victory which hark to the conquest of Metapontum. The allusion is further evoked by the head of the goddess Persephone on the obverse, who was especially venerated in the Lucan city.

Of the highest rarity and interest. The finest known specimen of one of the most desirable coins of Magna Graecia. An extraordinary composition, perfectly struck in the finest classical style,

beautifully toned and extremely fine 40'000

This nomos is among the oldest Heraclean issues. According to scholars, it is ascribable to a die-engraver from Taras. The coin bears an unusual representation of Athena: without helmet, but framed on the adorned background of the aegis (shield covered with goat-skin), surrounded by snakes. The reverse shows an equally unusual Heracles: the hero is not occupied in one of his amazing labours, instead he is caught at a moment of rest, reclining (this scheme was subsequently resumed by Croton on its later coins) on a rock draped with a lion-skin (the most characteristic attribute of the hero) and holding a chalice in his right hand. A club leans against the rock. The relationship between Heracles, wine, and the Dionysian world is known from various sources: myth (Heracles was at the service of the vine-dresser Sileus; Heracles and Folus), archaeology (the well-known drunken Heracles from Herculaneum, before 79 A.D.), and literature. The great lyric poet Stesichorus (VI cent. B.C.), probably born in Metauro (a Locrese colony not far from the modern Gioia Tauro in Calabria), refers in song to the struggle between the Centauri and Heracles over a pitcher of wine, a gift of Dionysus to the centaur Folus: "He took the right cup—it was a bowl / gigantic (nine liters / or thereabouts). He lifted it / he gulped down mixture offered him by Folus".

Heraclea was founded by the Tarentines and Thourians at around 443 B.C., ending the long war between the two cities over possession of the rich territory that formed the Syritides. The mintage of Heraclea, of which this is an admirable example, exactly reflects in its iconographic motif the two lineages that contributed to its foundation: Thourium, with the head of Athena; and Taras, with the figure of Heracles. Athena's helmet, to right, is decorated here with a hippocampus, or small sea-horse (hippocampus antiquorum), on which the mythical sea-horses of Poseidon's (Neptune's) chariot were probably modelled. This is alluded to by the Neapolitan poet Papinius Statius in his Tebaide (II 45 ff.): "Here [= to the Tenaro] Neptune leads his exhausted horses from the Aegean sea into port; their fore-hooves dug into the sand, their nether limbs, in the form of fish, submerged in the waves".

The reverse depicts one of the "twelve labours" (dodekàthlos) of Heracles, specifically his encounter with the Nemean lion: the hero crouches

on one knee, a club in his lowered right hand, with the left hand clasped tightly around the animal's neck as it hurls itself against Heracles' leg. In the exergue is an ear of wheat, alluding to the region's rich agriculture.

The obverse harks to the original formulation of an iconographic approach ascribable to the great die-engraver Eukleidas, active between circa 440-420 B.C. He was the main representative of the Attic artistic trends of the Phidian school (mostly for the types of the Athena of Phidias), and had a great influence on contemporary die-engravers. The head of the goddess appears three-quarters facing, i.e. apparently to front, but in reality with a slight inclination to the right. The long wavy hair framing her face escapes from beneath the beautiful Phrygian helmet. On the reverse, the figure of Heracles is instead fully frontal: the hero, standing with club raised in his right hand to deliver the final blow, holds the animal still with his left hand. The struggle with the Nemean lion constitutes perhaps one of the most famous labours of Heracles: the lion, an invincible monster descended from Echidna and Typhon or Orthrus, was sent by Hera to Nemea, in Argos, to destroy Heracles. The hero strangled the beast and wore its skin (leonté), using the beast's own claws as the only means capable of piercing the skin in order to strip it away from the corpse.

This beautiful Heraklean nomos has on its obverse the helmeted head of Athena, facing left. The bowl of the helmet is decorated with a sculpted figure of Scylla, the famous sea-monster of the Messina strait. On the reverse is a powerful representation of the struggle between the hero and the Nemean lion: the field of the coin features the club and the bow, traditional attributes of Heracles, as he engages in strangling the animal, his hands concealed in its thick mane. The lion's body is arched like a taut spring, its paws pointed angrily towards the hero's left leg. It should come as no surprise to find Scylla on a coin dedicated to the celebration of this renowned labour of Heracles: according to one of the variants on the myth, Scylla's death was actually attributed to him. When the hero crossed southern Italy returning from Geryon's lands, Scylla devoured a certain number of oxen he had taken with him. Heracles then started a combat which ended in her death. But afterwards Phorcys, with the help of lit torches, would have magically restored her daughter to life.

Here Athena's head is to the right. Scylla, decorating the bowl of the crested helmet, is captured in the act of hurling a stone. The nomos, work of the die-engraver Kal., shows on its reverse the usual motif of the struggle between the Nemean lion and Heracles, naked and turning to the right. The presence of an owl, a bird sacred to Athena (cf. Aristophanes, Aves 516) in the figurative space dedicated to the hero, creates a motif intermingled with that of Scylla, the monster killed by Heracles, rising instead from the goddess' helmet. The owl (glaux), which populated the woods of Attica, became the symbol of Athena: portrayed on the obverse of the great polis, and inspired the famous proverb glauka eis Athenas, "to carry owls to Athens" (cf. the Anglo-saxon aphorism "to carry coals to Newcastle"), meaning a wasted effort.

Only three other specimens of this rare issue are known (Wien; formerly Lecce; Frankfurt: s. G. Foerschner, Die Muenzen der Griecher in Italien und Sizilien [1986] 214). The die of our reverse is also found coupled with another type: Noe II 430 (Obv. Heracles head [see no. 135]. The chronology proposed by Noe has been correctly revised by A.Johnston.

In Homer's hymn to Apollo (cf. Hymn III 131) the new-born god claims the zithar and bow (*kitharis and toxon*) as his own. On this important nomos, Apollo is depicted as a zithar player, holding the instrument in his left hand, as he displays the plectrum his right. The zithar is most dear to Apollo in his role as patron of music and poetry and even the pseudo-hesiodic "shield" of Heracles (cf. vv 201 ss. passim) features "the sculpture of the sacred dance of the immortal gods: in the centre, the son of Zeus and Latona sweetly plays a golden zithar; the seat of the gods was pure Olympus where they held their assembly (...). The goddesses begin their song, the Muses of Pieria, and they seemed to sing so sweetly ". The laurel wreath which appears on the right hand side of the coin completes the symbolism of Apollo, who slayed the serpent of Delphi, Python. In fact, the Pythian games, second only to the Olympic games in importance, were held in Delphi and from ancient times there were prizes awarded for hymns written and dedicated to the gods. Later, horseracing and athletic competitions were added. The prizes presented were laurel wreaths, made of foliage gathered from the magical valley of Tempe in Beotia. The god of music also knew how to enchant animals and placate the evil forces of nature, thus protecting the interests of agriculture (together with shepherding and navigation). He was portrayed by the genius of Fidia in a bronze statue, as *Apollo Parnopios* "protector of the populace from locusts" who, according to Pausania the writer of Periegesis, promised to rid Attica of the plague of locusts. In fact on the reverse side of the coin we can see a grasshopper next to the usual ear of barley, which symbolises the agricultural prosperity of Metapontum. From Pliny the Elder's "Naturalis Historia" (XI 104) it is evident that the grasshopper did in fact plague the ancient world: "they are considered a plague sent out of divine wrath (deorum irae pestis ea intellegitur): in fact they appear so huge and fly with

It is generally recognised that the coins issued by Poseidonia (which became Paestum after the conquest by the Lucani) are the finest examples of those produced by carving into the reverse side the figure which appears in relief on its obverse. This coin was inspired by a dynamic, rather than static image of Poseidon, god and protector of the eponymous city: As in the scenes from the battle of the giants, he is naked, bearded, and his right hand is raised, holding a trident ready ready to be thrown. His left arm is held out in front, his cloak in folds around his arms. The same pose can also be observed in a bronze statue (Poseidon?) found in the vicinity of Capo Artemisio, and in the Zeus of Dodona. The trident (the tuna's fisherman's principal weapon) immediately draws our attention: the god *Ennosiagaios* "quaker of the earth" (cf. Homer, 11 XIII 43): he not only commands the waves, invokes storms and make the coastal rocks tremble, but also brings forth springs, like the "sea" which he created at the Acropolis in Athens (a salt-water well which, according to Pausania's account, was to be found in the area of the Erectum).

This nomos bears witness to the alliance between "Sirinos" and "Pyx" (the two legends appear engraved in the centre of obverse of the coin and in the lower quadrant on the reverse respectively). The word "Sirinos" was thought at one time to be the adjective relating to Siri, the city on the Ionian coast which was well known for its wealth and which was destroyed by the coalition of Sybaris, Metapontum and Croton in the years 570–560. Paola Zancani Montuoro, however, believes that the word in question is a noun and, for a variety of reasons, argues that a city called "Sirinos" (of the Sirini, a population from Lucania of which Pliny the Elder speaks in his "Naturalis historia" III 15, 97) existed and was situated about 30 km from Policastro. It has probably been identified in the ruins of a vast inhabited area on a rocky peak which stretches along the valley of Lauria near Rivello and which is still known as "The City". Policastro Bussentino is the modern name for "Pyx" (Pyxoes), the ancient Lucanian city (on the eponymous bay of Tirreno, now known as the gulf of Policastro, in the province of Salerno). The alliance of the two cities, based on commerce, testifies to Pixunte's importance for Sybari's commercial activity in the VI century (bear in mind that literary sources date its foundation by Micitus to 471). The bull looking backwards, and the coin's weight, are typical of Sybaritic coins.

The obverse and the reverse types are linked as an emblem of happy marriage, in this sense doubtlessly applicable to the alliance as between the two sea-powers of Carthage and the lesser Brettioi; Poseidon and Amphitrite are themselves an ideal divine pair, like the couples shown with them on an Attic bowl of about 425, LIMC 1, 1, p. 782, 52, Zeus-Hera, Dionysus-Ariadne, Ares-Aphrodite, Hades-Persephone; and like Dionysus and Ariadne have a triumphant thiasos, with erotes, naiads and tritons, and are borne in a car drawn by hippocamps, LIMC 1, 2, pp. 588f, 69 and 73, a Roman mosaics from the late Republic and late Empire. The symbols in the issue are all indicative of loyalty, wealth and abundance.

The traditions of the foundation of Croton and her maritime and agricultural life are both admirably illustrated on this coin. The first of these two traditions, connected to Heracles' travels in Italy, is portrayed on the obverse of this nomos: the young hero is resting from his amazing labours, naked and sitting with his bow and quiver on a lion's pelt, which covers the rock below. Heracles' pose is both sacred (in that he is holding a branch in his right hand) and regal (in that in his left hand he is holding a long sceptre). The scene of sacrifice is enriched by a flaming circular altar. In the exergue, two dolphins allude to the pleasant seaside location of this city. The second tradition connected to the foundation of Croton, refers to the founder, Myscellus, who, following the oracle at Delphi, founded the city (Heracles, in fact, is associated with the legend oikistas or "founder"): the delphian tripod on the reverse alludes to this tradition. On the left there is a grain of barley, symbolizing the importance of cereal farming in the area surrounding Croton.

This nomos belongs to the special coinage commemorating the alliance between the city of Croton and other cities. In this case, it refers to the alliance with the city of Temesa at the end of VI century.

Temesa, on the west coast of Bruttium, had close contacts with Croton and flourished in its shadow. The exact site of Temesa is not known, but it may have been founded at the mouth of the river Savuto, about 20 km northwest of Nicastro. The image of an elegantly outlined tripod, its feet in the form of lions' paws, can be seen on the obverse of the coin, representing Croton. The carved Corinthian helmet, which is roughly outlined, represents Temesa. The classification of the helmet as "Corinthian" already appeared in ancient times: cf. Herod. IV 180, and Cicero, In Verrem II 4, 97.

This nomos celebrates the alliance of Croton and Pandosia, a city in Bruttium. On the obverse is the Delphian tripod. The geographer Strabone (VI 2, 4) writes: "Syracuse was founded by Archias who sailed from Corinth at about the same time that Naxus and Megara were colonized. It is said that Archias went to Delphi at the same time as Myscellus, and when they were consulting the oracle, the god asked them whether they chose wealth on health; now Archias chose wealth and Myscellus health; accordingly, the god allowed the former to found Syracuse, and the latter Croton; and it actually came to pass that Crotonians took up their abode in a city that was exceeding healthful, and that Syracuse developed such exceptional wealth that its name became proverbial abroad".

The location of Pandosia, not far from Cosentia, which is represented by a bull framed in an elongated rectangle, is famous as the death-place of Alexander, king of Epiros. As Strabone writes (VI 1, 5): "Then comes Cosentia, the metropolis of the Brettii; a little above the city is Pandosia, a strong fortress, near which Alexander the Molossian was killed".

This nomos documents the historical period in which the alliance between Croton and Sybaris took place. We know that, after being influenced by the politics of Sybaris and defeated by the Locrese near the river Sagra, Croton reached its political and economic peak towards the end of the VI and the first half of the V century (the epoch in which this coin was minted). Under Pythagora of Samos there was a rapid transformation of the State of Croton, which became more conservative and aristocratic in structure. Its expansion policy resulted in the destruction of Sybaris, and Croton's control over the northern part of the area which is now known as Calabria.

In the decade between 520 and 510, Croton stringthened its alliance with Temesa, Pandosia and Sybaris. This nomos was minted to celebrate the bilateral alliance of Sybaris and Laos on one side, and of Croton on the other.

Laos was founded by the Sybaritics, probably around the second half of the VI century, when the metropolis of Sybaris was at the height of its power and dominion. When Sybaris was destroyed (511-510) as Herodotus tells us (VI 21), Laos adopted many of the inhabitants of Sybaris. This coin must, therefore be chronologically connected to the years immediately preceding this event. Strabo records the geographic location of this city (VI 1, 1): "After Pyxus comes another gulf, and also Laos – a river and city; it is the last of Leucanian cities, lying only a short distance above the sea, and is a colony of the Sybaritae, and the distance thither from Eleis is four hundred stadia". There have been various proposals as to the location of the ancient site: Scalea or perhaps (as Zancani suggests) "near the mouth of the river of the same name which, from the beginning, marked the northern borders of ancient Italy, which subsequently became the border between Lucania and Bruttium.

Pandosia, the Achean colony, was situated slightly above Cosentia (Strabo VI 1, 5), on the river Krathis (Crati). Strabo also tells us that Pandosia was once the royal residence of the kings of Enotria. Apart from general information, and the death of Alexander the Molossos, who was tricked by two oracles (Strabo Loc. C), we know very little of the story of this city, and only through numismatics can we retrace an alliance with the city of Croton. On the obverse of this fraction of nomos is the head of Hera, queen of the Olympus and Zeus's bride, depicted in a nearly full-face portrait, slightly turned to right, wearing a diadem adorned with small palm leaves, and a drop necklace. The reverse is very interesting and shows Pan, naked on rock, an untethered dog at his feet, about to run left. It is not surprising to find a dog beside the god of shepherds and sheep, whose cult spread far beyond the hellenic world. Pan particulary loved fresh springs and the shade of the woods; in fact he was usually portrayed with shepherd's crook (perhaps depicted behind the right arm of the god on this coin), pan-pipes, a pine crown or a pine branch in his hand.

This spectacular tetradrachm of Reghium, by the so called "Master of the Apollo of Rhegium", belongs to the fifth group, according to Herzfelder's classification., which can be attributed to the same period of time in which the famous Syracuse series of coins signed by exceptional die-engravers were minted. This was after Syracuse's victory over Athens in 413. Compared with the three most notable coin engravers of ancient times, the Master of the Apollo of Rhegium was considered more severe than Euainetos, more powerful than Herakleidas, and similar to Kimon in his ways. Thanks to him, on three tetradrachms (Herzfelder 72, 75 and 76) we can appreciate the creation of an image of Apollo which is unanimously agreed to be one of the finest in Greek art. The head of the god Archegetes, protector of Chalcidian settlements in Magna Graecia, on the reverse, is depicted with a delicate youthful expression: full faced, crowned with a laurel wreath but, above all, the drawing from the nape of his neck upwards is of incredible grace. The Apollinean symbols (in addition to the laurel, into which Dafne, the god of unhappy love, was transformed) are reinforced by the presence of two olive leaves on the left, which relate to the Aristeon cult in Rhegium (Aristeon was the son of Apollo and the nymph Cirene who invented the olive press and who spread the cultivation of olives). The obverse of the coin features the mask of a heraldic lion within a ring of pearls. It is typical of the coins produced in Rhegium, in that it depicts not the cadaver of an animal with eyes removed, but the face of a living, vital animal which, according to Greek symbolism, is connected to Apollo. This is confirmed by numerous models, statues and coins (see Leontini's and Mileto's coins on which, as in Rhegium, the lion and latterly a figure of Apollo, protector of this city, regularly appeared).

Perhaps during the 290's, but conceivably a decade before, Agathocles of Syracuse was involved in a poorly recorded campaign in Bruttium in which he captured Hipponium and Croton. Rhegium, as an ancient enemy of Syracuse, which had burnt Rhegium nearly two centuries before, should have been involved in some way. Our coin seems closely related to certain issues from Syracuse and Punic Sicily, and moreover the soler doing April and a line with the other states of the control of the c depicts the solar deity Apollo and a lion, which, although the emblems of the city since time immemorial, seem singularly appropriate to the typology favoured by the tyrants of the new hellenistic world. These splendid dies could well have been engraved by the master who cut the best dies of the Agathocles Kore coinage and perhaps also those of the vastly rare Ptolemaic-type gold stater of the same ruler.

Acragas, the second biggest city in Sicily, was founded by inhabitants of the nearby city of Gela, in the south-western corner of Sicily, at a site not far from the sea between the river Acragas, now called S. Biagio, and its tributary Hipas, now known as Drago. From the end of VI century onwards, there were two recurring symbols on the coins of Acragas: the first, an earth symbol, is the eagle; the second, a water symbol, is the crab (perhaps the astrological sign Cancer). The eagle was probably more important than the crab, as, unlike the crab, it is always present on these coins. This tetradrachm shows both images. On the obverse of the coin is a powerful eagle, its wings folded, about to rip apart with its strong talons the body of a hare lying on a rock. A pecten and a smaller shell suggest the scene of the hunt is near the sea. The reverse depicts a still-life of fish, shellfish and molluscs typical of the seas around Acragas.

"Lover of splendour, fairest of mortal cities, home of Persephone! Thou that inhabitest the hills of noble dwellings above the banks, where feed the sheep beside the stream of Acragas! I beseech thee, O queen, along with the kindly favour of gods and men, graciously to welcome, at the hands of renowned Midas, this coronal from Pytho, I beseech thee also to welcome himself, as champion of all Hellas in the art, which Pallas Athene invented when she wove into music the dismal death-dirge of the Gorgons bold." Thus the great Theban poet Pindarus opens the XII Pythic, with a cletic hymn to the city of Acragas, to welcome its son Midas, not an athlete but a flautist, and twice winner of the Pythian games in 490 and 486. In the V century Acragas reached both its political and artistic zenith, viz. the completion of the Doric temples, in particular the Olympeion (around 480).

The reverse of this coin shows a changed symbolism in the combination of the motif of the crab in the upper half, with the figure of Scylla in the lower half. The sea monster appears in the form of a young woman, naked from the waist up, with firm breasts and wild, tangled hair. Two dogs emerge from her sides, and her body ends in a long, twisted tail. Scylla has her right arm raised and her hand above her eyes, as if gazing into the distance. This recalls Homer (the Odyssey XII 93 ss) who in fact describes the monster lurking in a deep cave, its heads protruding from the forbidding cavern.

During the Athenian expeditions to Sicily in 414-413, Acragas found itself in the midst of a civil war, divided among factions supporting the various warring parties (cf. Thuc. VII 46). Acragas chose to remain neutral and not support Syracuse, the Spartan ally (cf. Thuc. VII 58). A few years later, the master engraver Polyainos (previously mistakenly identified as Polykrates) was at work in Acragas.

The obverse depicts a four-horsed chariot on the right. The charioteer holds the reins in both hands, as well as a kentron in his right hand. Nike descends towards the charioteer, bearing a victory garland. In the lower part is an upturned crab. Seltman, reflecting on Head's hypothesis, connects "the creation of decadrachms in Acragas" (and, let us add, this issue of tetradrachm) to the "celebration of the victory at the Olympic games in 412, by an Acragantine citizen named Exainetos who was brought back into his city in a chariot, escorted by three hundred others, all drawn by white horses. At the time, "the trier" would appear to have been first superseded by two far better men: Myron the chariot-maker; and Polykrates (Polyainos), maker of eagles". Now let us examine Polyainos' famous eagles, which are signed on a wing feather by the master craftsman himself. The two eagles on the left stand over a dead hare which is lying on a rock, with a lotus flower lying across it. The eagle in the foreground arches its neck and raises its head to emit a screech of joy; the eagle behind, on the other hand, is intent on tearing apart its prey, its wings outspread. It is an animated and dramatic scene, the best visual account of certain verses from the tragedy "Agamemnon" by Eschilius, in which two mystical eagles appear in the act of lacerating a pregnant hare, which foretold Agamemnon and Menelaos' (the two Atrydes) victory over the city of Troy. The chorus proclaims:

"Power is mine to proclaim the augury of triumph given on their way to princely men – since my age, inspired of the gods, breatheth upon me Persuasion, the strength of song – how that twin-throned command of the Acheans, the concordant captains of the youth Hellas, was sped with avenging spear and arm against the Teucrian land by the inspiriting omen appearing to the kings of the ships – the kingly birds, one black, one white of tail, hard by the palace, on the spear-hand, in a station full conspicuous, devouring a hare with brood unborn checked the last effort to escape". (Agamemn. vv. 104–120).

The city of Alesa, whose remains lie below the present-day city of Tusa on the northern coast of Sicily, was founded in 403 by Archonides, the lord of Herbita, who populated the city with citizens of Herbita and mercenary soldiers who had helped him to defend himself from Dionysus. As we can see from certain later coins, this is why it is also called Alaesa Archonidea. In Deodoro Siculo's estimation, the city was eight stadia from the sea. In 405, two years prior to the foundation, the Campani released by Emilcone following his treaty with Dionisius settled on the same site where Alesa would later be built. We know little about this story, and what we do know is due to this coin: it indicates that in the 4th century Alesa played a major role in the confederation of the Sicilian cities fostered by Timoleon of Syracuse. Here we have one of the rarest and heaviest examples of the "drachms" which were issued on that occasion. Another interesting detail is the fact that the bronze drachm in question exhibits traces of overstrike on an earlier Syracusan drachm.

Thuc. VI 2,2) and a pearl necklace. This representation of Sicily is typical of the *Symnachia* coins which can be traced back to Alesa, and which can also be found in similar coins from Morgantina. The minting of this coin was inspired by an historical event surrounding the figure of Timoleon. Around 365. Timoleon, an idealist from Corinth, conspired with friends to kill his brother, Timophanes, who had attempted to become dictator. Timoleon remained out of favour until 345, when he was sent by the Corinthians, along with a small corps of mercenaries, to their colony at Syracuse, where the nobles had requested help against the tyrant Dionysius II, who had recently become lord of the city once more. Timoleon also had to face leeta, an ambitious manipulator, who intended to usurp Dionysus' place with the support of a large Corinthian contingent. Through a mixture of bold strategy and unscrupulous diplomacy, Timoleon got the better of his adversaries and liberated Syracuse, where he subsequently initiated political and economic reforms and began a crusade against the tyrants dominating other cities. In 341, when the Carthaginians sent a large army to Sicily, Timoleon took the opportunity to launch a successful attack as they crossed the river Crimisio. However, when the tyrants and the Carthaginians instigated an alliance against him, he found himself in a period of great difficulty. In the end, he made peace with the Carthaginians and managed to defeat the tyrants, one by one, by extending his programme of reform throughout Grecian Sicily.

Eryx was a town of Elymian origin, known especially for its sanctuary of Aphrodite, one of the most celebrated in the ancient world. After the Carthaginian campain at the end of 5th century, Eryx naturally passed under Punic control and it remained one of their strongholds for the following century and half until the Roman victory in the first Punic war. This very rare and important tetradrachm belongs to the final phase of Erycian indipendence at the end of 5th century.

This tetradrachm was issued in 475–465 in Gela, a Rhodes / Crete colony founded in 698–688 by the *oikistai* Antifemus and Entimus. The motif of the armed rider is typical for the coinage of Gela: consider the important role played by the Geloan cavalry in the battle of Himera, on the northern coast of Sicily, during which Geloan and Teron defeated Terillus, tyrant of Himera, who was supported by the Carthaginians. Just as typical is the fluvial divinity of Gela depicted on the reverse: the colony was located on a low, long hill, west of the mouth of the river, in one of the richest areas of Sicily. The god is depicted in the form of a bull win a human, bearded face, its tail turned forward, in the act of prancing. The representation of the fluvial deity as a bull with a human face, so typical of Gelean coins, has been connected with the art of the Near East (in Assyrian art, the human-like bull appears winged or un-winged) and first appeared in Greek art to characterise the rivergod Achelous, unwinged, who fights against Hercules. Jenkins says: "On the coins, the man-faced bull version of the Achelous river god type is of a fairly wide occurrence, though there is no doubt that the greatest concentration of this river god type is to be found in Sicily. Specifically at Gela, of course, the type is introduced early in the fifth century and is the most constant of all coin types until 405".

This tetradrachm, Jenkins 103/1, the last of the first group coined in Gela, is the only example with the following combination of images: on the obverse we find a naked, bearded rider, with a conical helmet, galloping left with the reins in his left hand, and his right hand holding a lance ready for throwing. On the reverse is a raging bull, pawing the ground, its tail arched and its hind leg leg almost touching its head, which is depicted as a human and bearded. The figure of the rider is a recurring theme in Gela, and also shows the importance that the Gelean aristocracy and other towns of Sicily placed on the horse-racing and other equine activities both military and sporting. We know that Gela was the home city of Pantares, the first winner of the Olympic chariot race. Tyrant also emerged from the ranks of the Geloan cavaliers: the cavalier motif on the coin, according to Jenkins, "was introduced either by Hippocrates or Gelon; if the former, it may be possible to see it as a canting type with reference to the tyrant's name, or even an ideal portrait of the tyrant himself. The rider would be equally appropiate to Gelon, who was doripahros to Hippocrates and later hypparchos." Neverthless, the rider motif (also aprobates which means jumping from one horse to another during the race) and that of the horse (also on its own) is found not only on coins of the first Jenkins group, but also on later issues.

The inscription of the word "Sosipolis" which appears on the top of the reverse of this tetradrachm makes it particularly interesting. It is accompanied by a nymph who is crowning the river-god Gelas. The inscription  $\Sigma O\Sigma I\Pi OAI\Sigma$  could be the name of the nymph. However, the coin is probably commemorative. Scholars have pointed out that the general composition and design of the reverse is reminiscent of the tetradrachm from Himera and Selinunte, and they have concluded that the engraver may have been from Himera. The identity of Sosipolis, meaning "saviour of the city" remains a mystery: many hypotheses have been put forward regarding her identity. Scubring believes she may be Demetra, Eckelm and Holm, a Tyche of the city. Imhoof and von Sallet, on the other hand, believed her to be a kind of Nike and, in effect, Sosipolis has the role which Nike is seen to play on other coins, that is, crowning the bull. Sosipolis is not a mere replica of Nike, but a syncretistic form embodying the qualities of Nike with those of a local nymph. The first appearance of this type of coin can be dated back to approximately 430.

This exceptional tetradrachm of around 425 is one of the finest examples of coin production not only in Gela, but over Sicily as a whole. It is exceptional both for the pleasant re-working of traditional designs and for the incomparable beauty of the portrait of the fluvial divinity, Gela. On the obverse, we find the goddess Nike, as charioteer, with a quadriga on the right. One of the horses is depicted behind the other, using the perspective effect of double contour. The horses' heads are held parallel and their back hooves are clearly raised off the ground. The charioteer is wearing a long kiton (tunic) with a high belt, her wings half open, and her hair gathered in a chignon. She holds the reins with both hands, and her right hand also clasps a whip. Above the horses is an olive crown (also thought to be a laurel). Jenkins says: "The style is extremely refined and elegant; the long sinuous curve of the horses' bodies from the rump to the top of the head has close affinities to some of the deities of Selinus. The style of these Gelean deities is as distinct as the engravings on the reverse side (bear in mind that the image of Nike as a charioteer is found only on coins minted in Gela and Akragas; other gods represented as charioteers on Sicilian coins are Apollo and Artemis in Selinunte, Athena in Camarina and Demetra, and perhaps Eros, in Syracuse). The reverse depicts a beautiful, clean-shaven young head of the river god Gela, facing left. Only a horn on the front of his head and a half bull-like ear (the lobe human) remain of the more primitive, beastly aspect of this god. His hair is cut short and is arranged in symmetrical plaits held together by a diadem. To the left and right of the head and below the neck are three fish, perhaps mullet, obviously referring to the god Gelas' power over the seas.

This didrachm, from around 425, is of great interest not only because of the beautiful head of the river-god Gelas on the reverse side, but also the bold scene of a rider charging a warrior. The cavalier, mounted on his steed to the right, is about to spear a fallen warrior whose back is turned towards the observer. The cavalier is bearded, he is wearing a short tunic tied at the waist, and a mantle over his shoulder. The warrior, naked, has a crested helmet and is half covered by a large circular shield which hides the horse's hindquarters. The warrior is almost completely curled up, with only his left leg showing, pointing upwards (which suggests his fall) and his right arm stretched out behind (perhaps holding a sword which we cannot see). Neverthless, our attention is drawn to the centre of the composition, to the large spear raised on the right of the cavalier, poised for the mortal blow. It is worth nothing that no engraver had previously attempted this type of juxtapositioning: it was only in the 4th century that similar coins were produced by Pelinna of Thessalia and Patraos of Paeonia. The same master engraver is also responsible for the beautiful head, in profile, facing left, of the river-god Gela, young and un-bearded, which is also to be found on the reverse side of the coin. There is a marked contrast between the plainness of the hair above the diadem and the attention paid both to the curls below, and his expressive face, with a horn protruding from the forehead that pierces the nearest leaf of the crown of olives around his head (in place of the three fish found in n. 287). The head of Gelas has been compared on an artistic, rather than chronological, basis with the mintage of the early period of Euainetos of Syracuse.

This didrachm, the work of the master engraver Hyl., which was noted by Jenkins and Westermark as being "of great beauty and sensuous charm" relates on both the obverse and reverse to the Camarina's local cults. The personification of the river Hipparis, at whose estuary the city was founded, appears on the obverse; his young head facing left, short hair cropped close to his head, decorated with a double headband. A small horn on his forehead symbolises his fluvial divinity. On the reverse side, a female figure reclines elegantly on a swan which is taking flight across the waves. With her right arm, she clasps the creature's neck and in her left she holds the hem of her tunic, which is billowing in the wind. Her feet are depicted resting one on the other, perhaps in order to give a sense of firmness to her grip during the voyage. The engraver has succeeded admirably in creating a general air of lightness. The waves, in the form of stylised spirals, may hark to the stretch of water which lay in front of Camarina, or perhaps the river Hipparis itself. The interpretation of the scene on the reverse of the coin is still a matter of debate: it is now widely accepted that the female figure is the nymph Camarina, eponymous with the city on the southern coast of Sicily. The personification of the city in the form of a nymph appears on silver coins issued from 461 to 405, the year in which Camarina was destroyed by the Carthagenians.

The great poet Pindarus in "Olympic V", written around 465, sings praise to Psaumis for Camarina's chariot victory in the Olympic games (the authenticity of the piece has been a discussion point since ancient times). The ode, which resembles a processional chant, tells of the city. Camarina has just been rebuilt (V.8) and her dramatic past contrasts with the "light" (V: 14) which has been restored by the wise use of local water from the rivers Oanos and Hipparis, and the fortitude of her citizens (VV. 11 ss.):

"Daughter of the Ocean! Receive with happy heart the choicest prize of deeds of prowess and of crowns Olympian, the guerdon won by Psaumis and tireless-footed team – Psaumis who, exalting thy city, Camarina, that fostereth its people, at the greatest festivals of the Gods essayed to honour the twice six altars with the slaughter of oxen, and also with contests of games, lasting for five days, even with horses and mules, and with the riding of the single steed. And, by his victory, he hath set up for thee a bright renown, and hath caused to be proclaimed by the herald his father Acron and his newly founded home.

"Coming from the loved abodes of Oenomaus and of Pelops, he singeth of thy holy precinct, O Pallas, thou guardian of the State, and the river Oanis, and the lake of the land, and the sacred streams with which Hipparis watereth the folk; and he swifly weldeth together a soaring forest of steadfast dwellings, bringing this people of citizens out of perplexity into the light of day" (Pind. Olimp. V 1-14)

The work on the obverse of this coin is by Exakestidas (his signature can be read below the neck of Hipparis), a remarkable coin engraver,

The didrachm in question is a unique example of its type and as such is of great numismatic interest. Unlike the usual portrait of Hipparis in profile, with a small horn and short hair. Hipparis is shown here in an almost full-face portrait (slightly turned to left) with long hair framing his face, and two short horns extending in opposing directions from his forehead. On both sides of his neck, next to his face, are two fish. On the reverse we find the usual motif of the nymph, Camarina, in flight on the swan, this time however, enlivened with new detail: the swan is portrayed with great realism, as its feathers seem to glide on the crest of the waves. A fish leaps between the swan's wings and Camarina's feet. In mythology it is known that Zeus assumed the form of a swan in his union with Leda. In the sculpture of Leda and the swan, Leda is sitting on a rock holding the swan on her lap, which is fleeing from an eagle.

In 476, Hieron of Syracuse evacuated the city of Catana, renamed it Aetna and founded his new colony there, repopulating it with 10'000 Doric citizens. (The foundation of the city was celebrated by the great playwright Eschilus in his tragedy Aetneae.) However, the settlers were driven out around 460, and the native inhabitants returned and reinstated the former name of Catana. This tetradrachm refers to the years immediately after this event and depicts on the obverse the river-god Amenanos who is portrayed with a human, bearded head and an animal body. The river is mentioned in various works of ancient literature, in particular the poet Pyndarus in Pythica 67 cites the waters of Amena (a variation of the name Amenanos as the river, which crosses Etna and Catana, is otherwise known; this is its present-day name). The geographer Strabo (V 3, 13) refers to a problem with fluctuating water levels in lake Fucino by comparing it to a similar situation in the river Amenanus: "...as is said to be the case with the Amenanus, the river that flows through Catana, for it fails for many years, and then flows again". Perhaps the presence of the flocks of cranes on the obverse of this coin (gheranos, associated in ancient times with the swamps of Strimon and those of Axios) was due to the the river's flooding. The marine setting of the large bay mirroring Catana is represented by a fish on the lower field on obverse. On the reverse of the coin we find a striking figure of Nike wearing a long kiton and portrayed in flight to the right.

This tetradrachm, issued around 430-425, shows the first example of an engraver's signature on a Sicilian coin. The signature, in tiny letters, can be read on the curved parapet of a chariot, on the obverse of the coin. On the reverse is the head of Apollo "grandioso", according to Giulio Emanuele Rizzo: "his eye, still drawn from the front, shows the first step towards perspective; his uncut hair, parted on the forehead and surrounded by a laurel garland, is bound in a feminine, affected style of *krobylos*, tied in a head band which falls in waves behind the nape of his neck. On the obverse is a quadriga travelling right driven by a charioteer in typical garb, "a kiton down to his ankles" (chiton poderes). He is bending forwards over the bar of the chariot (antyx), clasping the reins in his left hand and the goad in his r. The composition of the four horses drawing the chariot is truly fascinating: the horse at the front is shown in its entirety, its head lowered to allow us to see the raised head of the third horse (the other two horses are depicted through a simple line of silhoutte). We cannot be sure if Kra... was also the artist responsible for the head on the reverse which, in terms of style and composition, is as well executed as the quadriga on obverse.

A lock falls in "a cluster" from the ear, a composed, serene, olympic expression emanates from the face of the god and in particular from his intense eyes. In front of the silhouette is written the inscription KATANAION.

This beautiful tetradrachm is the work of the "Maestro della foglia", dubbed thus for his habit of "signing" his work with a special type of leaf, instead of the usual initials or name: on the left hand side of the reverse of this coin we find an *apion* leaf next to the neatly designed head of Apollo, wearing a laurel crown in his hair. Apart from guaranteeing the authenticity (sphragis) of the master engraver, the apion leaf motiv (an apion crown was also first prize for winners of the games of Nemea in Argolis), is coherent with the image of Apollo as discoverer of the healing effects of plants, a quality which the god shared with Esculapius, according to the great Pythagoras, as Pliny the Elder informs us (Naturalis Historia XXV, 13). On other coins with greater mythological coherence (cf. nos. 396–397 in this catalogue), the Maestro's signature is represented by a laurel leaf.

Cf. Plin., Nat. hist. XII 3: "Some species of trees are particulary protected as each of them is dedicated to one divinity such as the

mediterranean oak to Jupiter, the laurel to Apollo, the olive to Minerva, the myrtle to Venus and the poplar to Hercules".

The great engraver Euainetos, who worked both in Catana, Camarina and above all in Syracuse, has succedeed in expressing on the reverse of this tetradrachm "the tumultous galloping of the horses incited by the charioteer at the turning point of the race" as Laura Breglia points out. The engraver's signature can be read on a tablet which is held up by Nike on the left. The neat, elegant, head of Apollo which appears, facing left, on the reverse, is justly as pleasantly and expressively depicted as on the obverse. The god's silhouette is marked by luminous and composed beauty: his hair, crowned by a laurel wreath, is characterised by a detailed and refined arrangment of the individual locks of hair. The circular space surrounding the divinity's head has also been used to great effect: in front, to the left of diadem is a string of four pearls at the end of which is a little bell (of unknown meaning); above is the inscription KATANAI $\Omega$ N; below, between the nape and the neck is a crayfish.

This is tetradrachm has been engraved by Herakleidas. On the obverse, rather than the reverse, we see the head of Apollo. Unlike the usual pattern (with the chariot on the front) the images have been inverted, bearing witness to Heracleidas' originality and artistic freedom. Apollo's head is depicted facing; his thick and abundant hair, criss-crossed by the laurel leaves of his crown, is less detailed and is shown as a soft mass, cascading around his face. The outline of the face itself is heavily marked; the lips are straight and firm, the eyes deep-set. No less vigorous is the chariot depicted on the reverse: the charioteer is holding the reins in both hands, together with a goad in his right, testifying to the fierce competition of the horse race and lending great dynamism to the entire composition, enriched by the usual motif of Nike flying to the right to crown the charioteer.

This coin, of great historical interest, can be dated at 520, some two centuries after the Chalcidese settlement was founded at Naxos in 736 B.C., and fifty years before the city fell under the domination of the Geloan Hippocrates (cf. Herodotus VII 154, 2). The drachm is an exemplary exposition of the archaic style, prominently revealed in the treatment of the pointed beard and, above all, in the great eye of the god Dionysus, facing. Dionysus' great mass of hair, thinly lined with pearls and bound with an ivy-wreath, creates a contrast with the straight lines of the netted beard. The reverse features a bunch of grapes, with the vine-branch, tendrils and vine-leaves symmetrically placed at the sides. According to myth, Dionysus discovered the possibilities of the vine on reaching adulthood, before Hera drove him mad and made him wander the world. God of wine and inspiration, Dionysus was celebrated in rowdy processions, along with representations of the spirits of earth and fertility.

This exceptional tetradrachm, the first example of this Naxos issue with the Attic standard, is certainly due to the skill of an extraordinary die-engraver active in Sicily during the first half of the fifth century. This die, of extreme rarity, is characterised by remarkable expressive vigorousness. The obverse shows the bearded profile of Dionysus, facing to right, with ivy-wreath and hair tied up high in a knot at the nape of his neck. The ivy wreath, beard and knot break the dotted circle framing the head. The reverse shows the figure of Silenus, squatting naked, his bearded face (like that of Dionysus) turned to the left. The right leg is raised, the left tucked sideways under it, making space for a long, equine tail. The right hand holds up a *kantharos* (a form of cup especially sacred to Dionysus), with two handles and without a base, while the left hand supports the athletic, muscular body and lends the figure an intimate tension. The iconographic type shared by both sides of the coin, Dionysus' head and the kneeling Silenus, subsequently became widespread at Naxos until the issues (didrachms) of the last phase of the V century. The inspiration of the great Sicilian die-engraver was encouraged by the commemorative value attached to this coin, recalling as it does the return of the Nassians to their homeland following their exile to Leontini, after 461 B.C. We know from Diodorus Siculus, the great historian born in Agirium (one of the most ancient colonies at the heart of Sicily), that Hieron the Syracusan moved the inhabitants of Naxos and Catana to Leontini in 476 B.C.: "Hieron removed the people of Naxos and Catana from their cities and sent there settlers of his own choosing, having gathered five thousand from Peloponnesus and added an equal number of others from Syracuse; and the name of Catana he changed to Aetna, and not only the territory of Catana but also much of the neighbouring land which he added to it he portioned out in allotments, up to the sum of ten thousand settlers [...] And the Naxi

At the time around 415 B.C. from which this coin dates (the years of the Peloponnesian war between Athens and Sparta: 431–404 B.C.), Naxos, the oldest Greek settlement in Sicily, founded in 736 B.C. by Chalcidians led by Tucles on the oriental coast of the island, joined the league of the island's Ionian cities against Syracuse and remained true to Athens throughout the conflict, until the defeat of Assinaro (413 B.C.). Although the types represented (head of Dionysus on the obverse and squatting Silenus on the reverse) are the same as those on earlier issues (cf. no. 384), their treatment is quite different. The profile of the god appears more realistic and human, even somewhat subdued. Silenus' left arm, no longer tensed to support his body, rests more easily on his left leg and holds a long thyrsus. The presence of an ivy plant on the left side of the coin further emphasises the Dionysian motif, emerging as it does from a roughm boulder on which Silenus leans and drapes his short equine tail.

It is well known that the first coins of the Achean colonies, in Magna Graecia on the Ionian sea, were differentiated (over and above differing weights) by means of a special "incuse" technique which involved carving the reverse of the coin (from the latin *incudere*, meaning carving through beating). The technique, first deployed in the area of Greece and Asia Minor, is found on this Syracusan tetradrachm, dated between 510 and 490. Typically for Syracusan coins, the obverse features a quadriga driven slowly to the right. On the reverse, at the centre of a carved border reminiscent of a swastika, is a small female head, almost like a tiny medal, identified as that of the nymph Arethusa, with hair of pearls and ribbons. According to mythology, Arethusa, the nymph of spring in Elis, hid on the island of Ortigia (near Syracuse) to escape the amorous advances of the fluvial god Alphius. She was transformed (by Artemis in one version) into a spring near the sea, surrounded by papyrus plants.

480 marked a most fortuituous event, not only in Greek history, but also for western civilization. The victory over barbarism was marked by two conquests: that of Salamina over the Persians, and of Himera over the Carthaginians, which the Greeks craftily used to their advantage. These two victories were commemorated by the minting of two special series of coins, one produced in Syracuse and the other in Athens. (The drachms had an impressive value, weighing about 45 grams.) The Syracusan series was attested to by Diodorus Siculus (XI 26, 3) who dubbed them "demarateion" after Demarete, the wife of Gelon of Syracuse, who had promised to mint a special coin in memory of the victory of Himera. To achieve this, she used large donations offered as ransom by the Carthaginian prisoners. Diodorus recounts the story thus: "The Carthaginians, having unexpectedly received their deliverance, not only agreed to all this but also promised to give in addition a gold crown to Demarete, the wife of Gelon. For Demarete at their request had contributed the greatest aid toward the conclusion of peace, and when she had received the crown of one hundred gold talents from them, she struck a Demareteion coin, named in her honour. This was worth ten attic drachms and, because of its weight, was called a pentekontalitron. by the Sicilian Greeks".

There has always been much debate as to the dating of this decadrachm series. It was thought to originate from a later date, somewhere between 470 and 460 (the first decadrachm was identified in 1830 by the Duke de Luynes; 18 examples are known today). Whatever the conclusion, we can neverthless be assured of a date after 480. Athens, pre-eminent within the Delphian-Attic League, was founded in 477. Syracuse had hegemony over Sicily and the Tyrrenian sea all the way to Cuma. Both cities were destined to become hubs of great "empires". On the obverse of this impressive coin is a quadriga to right. The beardless charioteer wears a long *kiton* or tunic tied at the waist. In his right hand he holds the reins, and in the left, a goad. He is leaning forwards, attempting to bring the horses to a halt after victory. Nike hovers above the horses to crown them; below, a lion with open jaws leaps to the right. On the reverse of the coin is a female head, crowned with an olive wreath, framed in a circle and surrounded by dolphins. The head is almost square, the shape is still rather harsh but the eye shows signs of being represented in profile, rather than face-on. The lips are full and slightly open; the hair is arranged over the nape, neck and forehead and hangs in waves below the parting. The Syracusan engraver has followed the "severe" trend which was prevalent in the Greek world in the first half of the V century, but the portrait also embodies western elements which are comparable, for example, to the Moirai from the temple in Selinunte. This would favour the late dating of this issue.

The significance of the exergual inscription A $\Theta$ AA is disputed. Early research attributed it to weapons captured by the Athenians in 413 B.C. and subsequently used as victory prizes at the martial games. In Dekadrachmon – Ein forschungsgeschichtliches Phänomen (1976) 118–124, M.R. Alföldi sees the inscription as referring to a tropaion erected after the victory of 413 B.C. For Kraay 224, it brings to mind the victory prize for the chariot race depicted on the reverse.

Finds and later replicas of the original design show that Kimon crafted both his Arethusa de face dies shortly before 405 B.C., the year that Dionysus I assumed power. This coin, the first decadrachm and prototype of the city's new large silver coinage, was created shortly thereafter. Signed on the obverse and reverse, the design as well as the issue of both coins indicates that they are new works. In the first decadrachm, Kimon used the centre of the field to depict a quadriga gliding at an even rhythm, as well as the beautiful female head. By contrast, his earlier small tetradrachms featured a quite different, more dynamic quadriga coupled with the newly-designed head of Arethusa (cf. no. 473). His signature also asserted authorship of the Arethusa prototype on the gold 100 litra coin (no. 475). Kimon's triumph, realised within just a few years at the Syracusan mint, lies in his fresh inventiveness, astonishing diversity, and the sheer craftsmanship of his die engraving.

Die wear on the common reverse indicates that Kimon engraved this head somewhat later than the previous one: the point-like traces of rust to the left under the exergual line and at the top right of the field are clearly visible. The description of the obverse illustrates the master's virtuoso variations on his original theme, made over time. The extremely fine hair has also become stronger: Kimon has changed both his scriber and his model. It is not, as might be thought, that the Syracusan lady on the prototype is younger. She is a different woman, more tender and withdrawn than the strong personality greeting us here.

Both his contemporaries and successors regarded Euainetos as the ultimate master. No work of ancient coinage has been copied over a longer period or more frequently than his signed Syracusan decadrachm. Most siculo-punic issues replicate the chariot and team, as well as the head on the obverse. The female head in particular must have made an unusually deep impression on the ancients, appearing not only gold and electrum carthaginian issues but on many 4th and 3rd century B.C. coins from sites as geographically disparate as Spain and Crete. In the 3rd century B.C., the head even served as the model for the tondo on varnished Greek bowls. From copyists' embellishments of corn ears and stalks, we can only assume that they interpreted Euainetos' female head as an effigy of Kore-Persphone. Most researchers have nonetheless interpreted the work as representing Arethusa, in which case the corn ears are out of place, although reeds of similar appearance would have fitted in very well. Such long-lasting impact and exceptional ubiquity is nevertheless understandable only in the context of a much-revered goddess, certainly not a local nymph.

Lipari, the largest of the Eolian islands, was founded by the Cnidi of Caria in the early sixth century. The reverse of this litra depicts an *aphlaston*, a decorated sternpost typically found on ancient ships of war and transportation, and considered a trophy. It consisted of four or five curved beams, in the shape of a fan, spread at the top and joined at the foot. The earliest written record of an *aphlaston* is that of an enemy ship to which Hector clings, in Homer's Illiad 717. The head on the obverse of the coin is thought to be that of Ephestus or, more likely, Aeolus. In the mythological epic tradition, Aeolus lives on a floating island, with bronze walls and sheer cliffs, with his wife, six sons and six daughters. Virgil refers to him as "king Aeolus (Aen. I 62), companion of the gods, although not a god" (V. 79) and sets him in Lipari (Aeoliamque...Liparen: Aen. VIII 416–17), near the island where Vulcano had his forge. The setting of Lipari, so near to the divine forge, must have been the inspiration for Virgil's decision to imprison the winds in "dark caves", rather than in leather pouches tied with a silver cord, as is the case in the Odyssey (X 19-24). The winds, which are liberated by Aeolus at Juno's command, transport Aenea's fleet away from Italy, towards the African coast and Carthage (Aen. I 50–141).
