Following the assassination of Caesar during the Ides of March in 44 BC, a climate of profound uncertainty dominated Rome. Brutus and Cassius, Caesar's assassins, travelled east that autumn, ostensibly to take control of Crete and Cyrene and to oversee grain supplies. Their real intention was to prepare men and arms in case a new civil war should break out. After the death of Irtius and Pansa in the battle of Modena (43 BC), Octavianus, who was elected consul at the age of twenty, revoked the amnesty agreement with the rebels. He had in the meantime been invested with full power over all the Eastern provices, and now joined Antonius and Lepidus to form the second triumvirate. Backed by the *Lex Pedia*, he immediately took steps to crush armed resistance from the republicans in the East. Lepidus remained in Rome, while Antonius and Octavianus landed in Dyrrachium and headed towards Macedonia. The northern slopes of Pangeus at Philippi were the setting for twin battles

in October 42, which ended in defeat for the republicans fighting under Brutus and Cassius. The obverse of this aureus bears the inscription MAQVINVS LEG(ATVS) LIBERTAS, coupled with the head of Libertas. This abstract concept was a beacon of stoic inspiration in republican propaganda directed against Caesar in his role as dictator perpetuus, and which even succeeded in convincing young Roman intellectuals such as the poet Horatio. On the reverse, Cassius is referred to as PR(O) COS, from which the coin's date can be inferred as 43 BC. The following story by Plutarcus (Vita Bruti 24) may shed light on the symbol of the tripod, a competive trophy related to the cult of Apollo: "The moment to drink arrived, and everyone toasted the victory of Brutus and the freedom of the Romans. Brutus, wishing to heighten his friends' exhortations, demanded a larger tankard; on receiving it, he spontaneously uttered the following verse:

"The dire Moira and Apollo slew me' [Omero, II XVI 849]

Historians also say that on leaving camp for the final battle of Philippi, his password to the sentry was "Apollo"; as such we conclude that the verse uttered was an omen of imminent disaster.

Lentulus Spinther is perhaps the son of Spinther, cos 57, who became legendary for his lavish expenditure while aedile and praetor and whose taste, as evidenced by the bust of Libertas, was influenced by the rich post-Sullan late hellenistic style that characterises the period of Pompey's triumphs. The spelling of Leibertas is self-consciously archaic, evoking ancient virtues in a style redolent of denarii issued earlier under Brutus. The reverse type symbolises the augurate of Spinther (or, of course, Cassius), authenticating his activities as moneyer.

The figure of Ventidius Bassus, and the story surrounding him, became an ancient model whose pervasiveness led to its inclusion in the index "Demutatione morum and fortunae" of the book "Memorable Episodes and Quotations" by Valerius Maximus (VI9,9). Giovenalis also cites this example (Sat. VII 197) as proof of virtue in the stars, and the astonishing power

of fate. But what was the myth behind Ventidius? A long chapter of *Noctes Atticae* (XV 4) by Aulus Gellius gives us a vivid biographical account of the mysterious character of lowly birth, who rose to the peaks of political life. "It was lately remarked in the conversation of certain old and learned men that in ancient times many persons of most obscure birth, who were previously held in great contempt, had risen to the highest office. Nothing, however, excited more wonder than the story of Ventidius Bassus. He was born at Picenum in humble circumstances, and with his mother was taken prisoner by Pompeius Strabo, father of Pompeius the Great, in the Social War in the course of which Strabo subdued the Aesculani. Afterwards, when Pompeius Strabo triumphed, the boy was carried in his mother's arms amid the rest of the captives as they filed past the general's chariot. As a grown man, he worked hard for his livelihood as a humble buyer of mules and carriages, which he had contracted with the State to furnish to the magistrates who had been allotted provinces. In that occupation he made the acquaintance of Iulius Caesar, and went with him to the Gallic provinces. His commendable energy in the province and prompt execution of commissions during the later civil war won him Caesar's friendship, and through this he rose to the highest rank. He was subsequently made tribune of the Commons, then praetor, at which time he was declared a public enemy by the Senate along with Mark Antony. When the parties were later united, he not only recovered his former rank, but gained first the Pontificate and then the consulship. Remembering that Ventidius Bassus had originally made his living as a mule-tender, the Roman people voiced their indignation through verses that were posted everywere about the city streets:

Assemble, soothsayers and augurs all! A potent mystery has taken place of late; For he who curried mules is consul now.

Suetonius Tranquillus writes that Mark Antony put this same Bassus in charge of the eastern provinces, and that when the Parthians invaded Syria he routed them in three battles; that he was the first to celebrate a triumph over the Partians, and that he was honoured with a public funeral.

The gold and silver coinage bearing the legend CAESAR DIVI F and IMP CAESAR represents Octavian's war coinage, struck for the payment of his troops before and after the battle of Actium. This aureus belongs to the series IMP CAESAR, which began around 29 BC and ended in 27 BC; the mint of this issue must have been Italian, probably at or near Octavian's naval headquarters in Brundisium.

The reverse type of this aureus celebrates Octavian's great victory over Antony and Cleopatra at Actium.

The Battle of Actium, fought on 2nd September 31 BC in the gulf of Ambracia, marked a turnaround in the war between Octavianus on one side, and Antony who was allied to Cleopatra, Queen of Egypt, on the other: the flagship bearing Antony and Cleopatra was forced to flee due to the treason by the eastern forces. When Octavianus invaded Alexandria a few moths later in 30 BC, Antony and Cleopatra were forced to take their own lives. The Roman forces swept away all resistance in Egypt and Octavianus took control as the heir to the Egyptian kings, establishing the Prefecture of Egypt, which he first entrusted to Cornelius Gallus. The entire bureaucratic machine remained just as it had been created by the Ptolemys. There was cultural continuity too, as shown by the presence of the crocodile on the reverse of this denarius. The crocodile (sobek in Egyptian, souchos in Greek) was the most important divinity in the Fayyum region. This was a vast oasis situated approximately 80 km south-west of Cairo, surrounded by pools teeming with fish and woods abundant with birds and anmals. The Augustean geographer Strabo (XVII 1, 38 C 811) testifies to the veneration afforded to the crocodile, the sacred animal in the situation of the sacred line. in the city of Arsinoe, the "city of Crocodiles"

#### Octavian as Augustus, 27 BC - AD 14

Of the highest rarity, only three specimens known (Bibliothéque Nationale, Leningrad, and this coin) from only one pair of dies. One of the most prestigious and celebrated coins of the Roman Empire and probably the most desirable of the coinage of Augustus. An exceptional portrait of magnificent style,

The obverse of this aureus depicts Augustus' head crowned with a laurel wreath, and the reverse shows the heifer of Myron. The portrait shows a softness of form in the modelling and a certain field smoothness in the rendering of the skin, with little effect of shadow. These features combine to create a most noble image, with great detail in the hair gathered on top of the head and falling in ringlets which frames an extremely faithful rendition of the facial characteristics, contrasting with the stylised

and falling in finglets which frames are extremely falling from the first of Giard 1008.

Myron of Eleutere, and latterly of Athens, was one of the most famous sculptors of the fifth century along with Phidias and Polyclitus, The heifer he sculpted in Beotia was celebrated in both the classical and Byzantine worlds (cf. Tzetz., Chil. VII 370). Myron was a master of bovine sculpture (bouplastas: Dioscorides in Anth. Pal. IX 734); the four bronze bulls are in the complex of Apollo Palatinus have been attributed to him (Propertius II 31, 7 s.; "vivida"). 370). Myron was a master of bovine sculpture (bouplastas: Dioscorides in Anth. Pal. IX 734); the four bronze buils surrounding the altar in the porticus of the temple of Apollo Palatinus have been attributed to him (Propertius II 31, 7 s.: "vivida signa", "statues full of life"). He successfully imparted bronze with softness and living form, creating a sensation of animation in the heifer in the Acropolis consecrated to Athena, probably on the occasion of the Panathenee. The Anthologia Palatina has preserved not less than 34 epigrams (cf. Anth. Pal. IX 713-742; IX 793-798) attesting to the extraordinary veritas of the effigy, with its extraordinarily natural appearance apparently capable of fooling even a calf which would greet it as though it were its natural mother (Anth. Pal. IX 733). The following epigram by Leonidas of Taras (Anth. Pal. IX 719) who lived "Myron did not mould me; he lied; but driving me from the herd, he fixed me to a stone base".

For the Roman world we can as well quote the following epigram by the Latin poet Decimus Magnus Ausonius (circa 310–393 AD). Epigram 56 of the collection, followed by another seven also dedicated to the heifer of Myron, continues thus:

Bucula sum, caelo genitoris facta Myronis aerea: nec factam me puto, sed genitam. Sic me taurus init, sic proxima bucula mugit, sic vitulus sitiens ubera nostra petit. Miraris quod fallo gregem? Gregis ipse magister inter pascentes me numerare solet.

The heifer passed from Athens to Rome, where it was admired in the temple of peace erected between 71 and 75 AD by Vespasianus, the first emperor of the Flavian dynasty. Procopius of Caesarea, the Greek Byzantine historian, also refers to the heifer in his *De bello Gothico* (VI 21): "And there (= in the Forum of Peace) is also the heifer of Myron". Procopius' information is also interesting because it explains the presence of the heifer on Vespasian gold coins (cf. C 117).

	This denarius, with a man-faced bull being crowned by Victory on its reverse, follows the commemorative iconographic motif typical for the coinage of Greek cities such as Neapolis. Naples was a Greek city (graeca urbs) in the Augustean age, as we learn from Strabo (V 4, 7, C 246) a contemporary of the emperor. "This is revealed in the names of their demarchs, for the earliest names are Greek only, whereas the later are Greek mixed with Campanian. And very many traces of Greek culture are preserved there, Gymnasia, Ephebeia, Phratriae, and Greek names of things, although the people are Romans". Numerous official records testify to the emperor's ties with Naples in particular, and with the Campanian area in general (comprising the island of Capri which Augustus received from the city of Naples in exchange for Ischia: cf. Suet., Aug. 92). One example is Pollio's villa in Posillipo, between Naples and Puteoli, inherited by him in 15 BC (cf. Cass. Dio. The greek inspiration for the bull (also for the heifer of Myron, which appears on lot 240) was united with the Roman tradition of the golden ox (bronze dipped in gold) which originated on the Greek island of Aegina and is to be seen in the Foro Boario in Rome (Plin. 	This wonderful Augustean denarius is of great importance in the study of contemporary imperial propaganda. It shows the bare head of the emperor facing to the r. and on the reverse, the images of a tiara (the raised headdress typical of the Armenians and other Asian peoples, which was a symbol of royal authority), a quiver and a bow case.  After the battle of Actium, Octavian Augustus was the only remaining head of empire. Claudius was just one year old when his father died in 9 BC, but he could draw proud inspiration from his distinguished parent, one of the most able and faithful of Augustus' collaborators (cf. Suet. Vita Claudii 2). Svetonius gives us a beautiful biographical profile of Drusus, including the posthumous honours such as the erection of an honorary arch which we find on the reverse of this sesterce (Vita Claudii 1): "This Drusus, while holding the offices of quaestor and praetor, was commander-in-chief of the war in Raetia, and later in Germany. He was the first of the Roman generals to sail the northern ocean, and with prodigious labour he constructed the huge canals beyond the Rhine which bear his name to this very day. Even after he had defeated the enemy in many battles and driven them far into the wilds of the interior, he did not cease his pursuit until a larger-than-life apparition of a barbarian woman, speaking in the Latin tongue, forbade him to push his victory further. For these exploits he received the honour of an ovation with the triumphal regalia; and immediately after his praetorship he became consul and resumed his campaign, but died in his summer camp, which for that reason was given the name of "Accursed". The body was carried by the leading men of the free towns and colonies of Rome, where it was met and received by the decuries of scribes, and buried in the Campus Martius. The army erected a monument in his honour, about which the soldiers should make a ceremonial run each year thereafter on a stated day, which the cities of Gaul were to observe with prayers and sacrifices. The Senate, in addition to many other honours, voted him a marble arch with trophies on the Appian Way, and the surname Germanicus for himself and his discendants". Julia Agrippina, dubbed Minor to distinguish her from her mother, Agrippina Maior, was born in 15 AD in a village in Germany, in the area of Ubii, where her father Germanicus, nephew of emperor Tiberius, was stationed as a military commander. In 28 AD, before her fourteenth birthday, she was given in marriage to Cn. Domitius Ahenobarbus, of rich lineage and about thirty years older than she.

The year 37 marked an eventful period in Agrippina's life; her brother Caligula became emperor and she gave birth to Nero.

Along with her sister Julia (the other sister Drusilla died in 38 AD), she was involved in a conspiracy led by Aemilius Lepidus (Drusilla's husband), as a result of which she was exiled to the Pontine islands (cf. Dio, Cass. LIX 22, 8).

Just a year later, after the assassination of Caligula, and her uncle Caludius' succession to the throne, the ambitious Agrippina succeeded in ingratiating herself with the new emperor, so that when the empress consort Valeria Messalina was charged with conspiracy in 48, the "new flame" was ready to take her place and open the way to the throne for her son Lucius Domitius, the future Nero.

In 49 AD, as Cassius Dionis irrefutably claims (LX 33, 2), Agrippina Minor was granted the use of the *carpentum*, a prerogative which had been awarded to Messalina in 43 AD (Cass. Dio. LX 22, 3). Agrippina rapidly became a second Messalina, the more so as she obtained from the Senate the right to use the *carpentum* at festivals, as well as other honours. The title AVG(VSTA) which appears on our sestertius (part of a very rare series which were minted as gifts for soldiers in the Balkans) which dates back to 50 AD (Cass. Dio. LX 33, 2) serves as a valuable *terminus post quem* in terms of coin dating. In Tacitus (*Annales* XII 42, 2) we find the same information as in Cassius Dionis, with the exception that Agrippina gives herself the honour of the *carpentum* before the subordinated Claudius. "Agrippina elevated herself to a prestigious position, travelling to the Capitol in a ceremonial *carpentum*, an honour which in ancient times was granted only to priests and images of gods". The roots of this honour go back to 396 BC, the year of the conquest of Veio. In recognition of their acts of generosity, Roman women who had donated their jewellery in fulfullment of a promise to gather gold as an offering to Apollo in exchange for his aid were granted the privilege of travelling by quadriga (*pilentum*) and chariot (*iunctum vehiculum*) to religious games and by chariot (*carpentum*) on other days. Following the Lex Oppia, presented by the plebeian tribune Caius Oppius in 215 BC, the use of the two-horse chariot (*iunctum vehiculum*) was strictly limited to occasions of public religious ceremony. Their use was reintroduced after the law was repealed in 195 BC. It is interesting to remember at this point that, during the Julio / Cludia dynasty, the emperor Caligula, as numismatic documentation testifies, granted his mother the posthumous honour of the *carpentum* (*circenses carpentumque quo in pompa traduceretur*) to prove his filial piety, as had Claudius to honour his deceased mother, Antonia Minor, Caligula's g

"Let barbarous Memphis speak no more of the wonder of the pyramids, nor Assyrian toil boast of Babylon; nor let the soft Ionians be extolled for Trivia's temple, let the altar of many horns say naught of Delos; nor let the Carians exalt to the skies with extravagant praises the Mausoleum poised in empty air. All labour yelds to Caesar's Amphiteatre. Fame shall tell of one work in lieu of all".

Thus sang Marcus Valerius Martialis in his first epigram in *Liber de spectaculis* ("the book of performances") written for the inauguration of the Flavian amphitheatre in 80 AD (also called the Colloseum due to its proximity to Nero's *Colossus* from 1000 onwards). Titus' was, in effect, the second grand inauguration (100 days of games and 5000 wild beasts killed) the first

being that of Vespasianus, Titus' father and founder of the Flavian dynasty, prior to his death.

In Vespasianus' lifetime, the work had reached the second level of the external structure, the third section of the steps. Late IV century chronicles inform us that under Domitianus, Titus' brother and successor, the building was completed "to the shields", that is, right up to the decoration on the highest external level. The building was erected in the valley between Palatinus, Esquilinus and Celius that also served as the water reservoir for Nero's *Domus Aurea*. It was restored by Antoninus Pius and then by Elagabalus and Severus Alexander, after which it was seriously damaged by lightning in 217. The amphitheatre suffered further damage in the earthquake of 442, which required restorations documented by inscriptions in honour of Theodosius II and Valentinianus III. The building's destruction began in the VIII century. The representation of the Flavian amphitheatre on the reverse of this sestertius is the earliest that we have; the coin shows an aerial view of the interior and exterior of the colossal structure, next to the contemporary monumental fountain *Meta Sudans*. (Its conical water flows were reminiscent of the turning pole in the *circus*. It was demolished in 1936, because it "spoiled the square"!!) The reverse also shows a porticus which was possibly part of the former *Domus Aurea*.

The features are those of an older person who retains all the vigour of youth; it is not surprising that he is associated with the cult of Hercules. The worship of this god, who does not appear in the official Roman cult and who was especially honoured by slaves, was widespread in the provices from Gallia to Spain, and above all in Illyria. In our opinion the portrait on this medallion has been engraved by the same master responsible of the portrait of the most famous sestertius of Hadrian (ex M&M 52, 1975, 617 and Hunt I, 1990, 134 sales). Charles Seltaman attributed it to an artist known as the Alphaeus Master, and it has also been thought that this superb engraver may in fact be the sculptor Antonianus of Aphrodisias. "He studied painting with the master Diogenetus, he loved boxing, wrestling, running, excelled in ball games and participated in hunting, but he partially abandoned these activities to dedicate himself to the study of philosophy, which gave his character a touch of sobriety and seriousness, yet without detracting from the cordiality he afforded above all to his family, but also to friends and strangers. He was in fact sober without being ostentious, reserved but not indolent, severe but not surly": this is the human portrait of the emperor Marcus Aurelius sketched by Julius Capitolinus in his "Storia Augusta". The image on this medallion depicts Marcus Aurlius as a young man with full oval face and an abundant mass of softly styled, curly hair. The

reverse recalls vividly the equestrian statue of Marcus Aurelius in gold-dipped bronze, rescued from destruction because it was thought to be Constantine. In 1538, on Michelangelo's advice, it was transported from the area of Laterano to embellish the Piazza del Campidoglio.

The obverse with a masterly engraved portrait of Crispina, and the reverse wth an 45'000 incredibly well-detailed scene of great beauty and fascination. Good extremely fine "Commodus had his sister Lucilla exiled to Capri, then killed, whereupon he gave one of his concubines the name of his mother; having caught his wife in the act of flagrant adultery, he sent her into exile and had her killed". Without expressly referring to her by name, Elius Lempridus in his Vita Commodi thus includes Bruttia Crispina among the victims of the cruelty of Marcus Aurelius' son. She was of consular family, married Commodus in 178 and was empress from 180 to 187. the year she was slain. The obverse of this medallion depicts a lovely bust, of sober classicism. The neat profile of the young woman's face, her hair styled in the typical "melon" fashion (the hair carefully parted and divided across the head, and gathered in a cluster on the crown) is particulary striking. She is gazing sideways and her expression adds an air of spirituality to this fine portrait. The reverse shows an impressive sacrifical scene. The depiction of the Circus Maximus on the reverse of this wonderful sestertius is of great interest from a Roman architectural point of view. While Caracalla is generally associated with the building of the *Thermae Antoninianae*, he is rarely given recognition for the enlargement of the entrances to the Circus Maximus, after the partial collapse of the surviving wooden structure, under Antoninus plus. The reverse celebrates this phase of restoration and extension, shows with splendid precision the obelisk of Heliopolis, which Augustus placed in the centre of the circus in 10 BC, dedicating it to the Sun. Also visible is the archway of the main gate at the south of the circus, built by Vespasian and Titus to replace that of Stertinus which was probably destroyed in the Neronian fire of 64 AD.

This coin, of exceptional iconographical and documentary value, shows on the reverse the features of the *Nymphaeum divi Alexandri*, one of the three nymphaea explicitly listed by name (the others are the *Nymphaeua Tria* on the Aventine and the *Nymphaeum Iovis* beneath the present-day Piazza S. Silvestro) of the fifteen assessed in the city of Rome, according to the catalogue of the *regiones* of the fourth century AD.

The nymphaeum (or monumental fountain) of Alexander Severus has been identified with the imposing brick structure known as "Trophies of Marius", for the presence of two marble reliefs dating from the reign of Domitian (removed in 1590 and carried onto the baluster of the Capitol, where they still remain). The enormous fountain, which was once covered with marble ornaments, today rises at the northern corner of Piazza Vittorio Emanuele II (at the fork of the Via Labicana and Via Collatina) and is fed by the Aqua Iulia (corresponds exactly to the "Mostra"). The fountain features a trapezoidal plant, expanding on three tiers in the style of the scenae froms, (i.e. imitating the stage-front prospect of the playhouse), with a large central niche (reminiscent of the monument of Philopappus in Athens), and two minor side niches, containing two great marble trophies. A semi-circular basin in the foreground was used for drawing the water falling from above

(reminiscent of the monument of Philopappus in Afriens), and two minor side inches, containing two great marble trophies. A semi-circular basin in the foreground was used for drawing the water falling from above. The "water supply" is due to Alexander Severus, whose other credits include the rebuilding in 227 AD of the Thermae of Nero (later known as the *Thermae Alexandrinae*) at the Campo Marzio, NW of the Pantheon. These civil engineering achievements are summarised in the "Life of Alexander Severo" (chap. 25) contained in the *Historia Augusta*, as follows: "He rebuilt the edifices raised by his predecessors and saw to the erecting of many others, including the Thermae named after him, sited next to the old Thermae of Nero and fed by the aqueduct now called Alexandrine".

Constantine, like Augustus, controlled the political scene after a long period of civil war. Just like his illustrious predecessor, his skill at pacifying the various provinces and bringing unity to the Empire made him a godsend. Hence the glorification, on some unusual contemporary issues, of both his persona and the benefits of his intervention. Here we have one of the many representations of Victory, the traditional motif in imperial propaganda: depicted full-face, resting, with the shield of Vota. The figure's open wings and moving drapes evoke the image of the angel which was to appear in Christian art as the representation of the triumph of the Faith. The motif of the Victores Augusti in the inscription merges with that of the Vota blessing the dynastic future of the Empire, which Constantine ruled with statesmanship and proverbial energy. The inscription VICTORIBVS AVGG underlines the concept that the victory of the Empire is inseparable from its leader, who is also the highest military authority.

This issue, dated 315 (the year of the *decennalia*), historically belongs to a period of great achievements starting with the defeat of Maxentius at Ponte Milvio (28th October 312). As a consequence, the new image of the emperor becomes idealised in contemporary portraits, permeated with the concepts of majesty, beauty and heroism, as a sign of rekindling a resemblance to Augustus.

Hailed Augustus by the Gallic army (25th July 306) after the death of his father Constantius Chlorus, forced to fight to maintain his position against Maxentius (who died in 312), Daja (who died in 313) and Licinius (who was defeated and killed in 324 or 325), Constantine was finally in a position of total power. This series belongs to the period between 324 and 326. the latter being the year of the *vicennalia* celebrations. On the reverse of this solidus, the figure of *Respublica*, with a turreted crown, offers the Victoriola to Constantine, who is standing face-on, wearing a cloak and *trabea* (a garment decorated with purple bands, used by kings), while *Pax* offers him a wreath. The Victoriola, or statue of Victory, became customary on the hand of divinity (usually *Iuppiter, Mars, Minerva, Venus, Hercules, Roma*). Delivered to the emperor, it merges with the superhuman and personifies, with public desire (*vota publica*), the victorious deliverance of the entire population.

The image of the empress Fausta appears on coins with a regular profile, large eyes and classic wavy hair, in the style of the Antonines (there is a marked similarity to the portrait of Faustina Minor, Marcus Aurelius' wife). Fausta, who was the younger daughter of Maximianus Herculius and Euthropia, married Constantine the Great (Minervina's widower) in 307 and bore him six children, three female and three male: Constantine II, Constantius II and Constans Nominated Augusta in 325, she was gifted with both spiritual and physical charms (as eulogies by ancient writers such as Eumenius and Julianus testify), but allowed herself to be drawn into political intrigues and disorderliness Accused of adultery, she was assassinated in August 326, meeting her end through strangulation in a hot bath. This took place shortly after the murder of her stepson Crispus, in which she was involved.

Justa Grata Honoria, older sister of Valentinianus III, was born in 417 or 418 from the marriage of Flavius Constantius (who was the emperor for a short period of time with the name of Constantius III) and Galla Placidia, stepsister of the emperors Arcadius and Honorius, and daughter of Theodosius the Great. At the time when the precarious order of the Western Empire was about to be shaken by invasions and raids by Vandals, Danes and other barbarous peoples, Attila the Fierce, King of the Huns, repeatedly requested her hand in marriage. Honoria, whose profile we know through her image on coins minted in Ravenna, reflecting the style of her mother Galla Placidia, died in or before 453.

The throne of the eastern empire remained vacant for about four mounths, after which the patrician Gudabad offered the imperial robes to Glycerius, the Olybrian court official (March 473). Despite tumults and external dangers, Glycerius's empire lasted for more than a year, until 474. It was undermined by the open hostility of Leo I, emperor of the East, who not only refused to accept Glycerius' election but also sent a military expedition against the new Augustus, under the command of Julius Nepos, Dalmatia's <i>magister militum</i> . Glycerius' isolation was completed by the sudden departure of Gundabad from Italy. Glycerius could only look on helplessly as Julius Nepos landed at Ravenna; as Nepos was acclaimed Caesar, he fled from there towards Rome, but was captured and imprisoned in Porto (Marina di Ravenna), dethroned, and demoted to bishop of Salona. Glycerius was still living in Salona	

in 480 when Julius Nepos, having escaped to Dalmatia after the uprising of Oreste, Romolus Augustus' father, met his death there. His killing could have been plotted by Glycerius.

Witigis was a man of unknown origins, who neverthless had excelled in battle near Sirmium, when Theodoric was fighting the Gepidi. Procopius of Caesarea recalls, in his historic work dedicated to the Gothic war, Witigis' rise from the role of Amalasuntha's advisor (in place of the deposed Thodatus) to the royal rank in the autumn of 536. To legitimise his position, Witigis forced Matasuntha, Amalasuntha's young daughter, into marriage while placing her monogram on coins, thus becoming part of the race of the Amals. Meanwhile, he decamped from Rome to Ravenna, where he organized the resistance against Belisarius, Justinian's great general during the Gothic war. After an unsuccessful attempt to recapture Rome (537-538), he won back Milan (538) but was in the end outdone by Belisarius at Ravenna. After being taken as a prisoner to Constantinople, he became a patrician and a friend of Justinian. In fact, he was the last Ostrogothic king to be recognised by the imperial laws.
