Bidding usually begins at 80% of the estimate, provided no higher offers have been submitted. Written bids have priority over telephone and electronic bids. The successful bidder has committed himself personally to the purchases made. He cannot claim to have acted on behalf of a third party.
- 2. Absentee bidders can send bids electronically until the start of the sale. In addition, all restricted coins from mints that are now within the modern boundaries of Bulgaria, Cyprus, Egypt, Iran, Iraq, Syria, Libya, Algeria, Jordan, Morocco and Turkey were, in the case of Bulgaria, Cyprus, Egypt and Iran, outside of those countries before 30 May 2005, in the case of Iraq before 2 August 1990, in the case of Syria before 15 March 2011, in the case of Libya before February 2018, in the case of Algeria, before August 2019, in the case of Jordan before 5 February 2020 and in the case of Morocco before January 2021 and in the case of Turkey, before 16 June 2021. Numismatica Ars Classica NAC AG will provide appropriate documentation to assist with the importation of any purchased lots into the USA.

Foreword

Roman Republican coinage is one of the most fascinating, varied and collected series in the field of ancient numismatics; practically every year a new type was minted either to celebrate the values of the Republic, a particular historic event, or to commemorate the family history of the moneyers who issued them.

I believe, without false modesty, that no other auction house has sold as many important coins of the Roman Republic as NAC. It is a field that was particularly held dear by my father having first collected and then studied the series with great passion and abnegation.

Each Roman Republican collection we have had the privilege of selling over the years has had its own particular merits; the RBW was exceptionally complete including also bronze coinage, the Student and his Mentor was particularly outstanding as his gold component was exceptional, whereas the Dioscuri collection we are presenting today is second to no other collection we have sold to date for its remarkably high quality.

In the history of Roman Republican numismatics, only the Nicolas collection (Leu 17, 1974), my father's collection (sold anonymously through NFA in 1991) and the collection of Pepe Fernandez Molina, can be compared to the Dioscuri collection in terms of quality.

Every single coin has been chosen by our anonymous collector with passion and immense care, waiting perhaps for years, for the right coin to come about on the market and always refining the collection by upgrading pieces when a better specimen became available. The result is a collection of jewels comprising dozens and dozens of coins which could easily be described as the best known example and results in a veritable gallery of perfectly preserved coins which allows us to fully appreciate every artistic detail and the craftmanship of the Roman Republican die engravers.

The collection continues beyond the Republic and includes over 150 Imperial denarii, all in an exceptional state of preservation, along with a small, but very fine selection of Roman aurei. In the Imperial section, we cannot fail to mention the denarii of Octavian as Augustus which is the logical compendium of a Republican collection. No other emperor understood better than Octavian, who was a great politician, the importance of coins as a means of propaganda and communication; as a result his coinage, along with that of Hadrian, is the most interesting and varied of the entire Imperial series.

Our collector, an exceedingly busy and successful individual, devoted a large amount of his spare time not only to studying coins but also to documenting and generously sharing his collection with others through his website: www.thedioscuricollection.com, In his own words:

"Apart from very exceptional cases, it is rare to have free access to private collections. Due to an aversion to risk, private collections are not usually seen out of the inner circle of collectors and their collaborators, who generally have sought to avoid notoriety and have managed to protect the collection from curious and prying eyes.

With the arrival of the Internet, the situation is now so different that this new scenario was probably the determining factor in my decision to present The Dioscuri Collection." *

This wonderful website boasts photos of the entire collection with high quality images and is open to all Roman Republican coin collectors and enthusiasts.

This catalogue represents the completion of a beautiful adventure that lasted almost twenty years, but it does not mark the end of our collector's interest in numismatics, as he wishes to continue to curate and improve his website www.thedioscuricollection.com over the years to come.

It will not be easy, but we very much hope that these wonderful coins will be welcomed into collections which incite the same passion and fascination in their creators.

I would like to end this foreword on a personal note by thanking the collector for many years of friendship and mutual esteem.

Although this rare denarius generally conforms to the traditional typology of the head of Roma on the obverse and the quadriga of Jupiter on the reverse, it features a number of remarkable additions. The anguipede giant trampled under the hooves of Jupiter's horses is sometimes interpreted as the monstrous Typhon, who seems to have already been struck by one of Jupiter's thunderbolts. Meanwhile, in the sky above, the head of Sol, a lunar crescent and a star can be seen. These celestial elements seem to refer to the mythological tradition that Gaia, the mother of the giants, attempted to save them by seeking out a magic herb that would make them invulnerable, but Jupiter forbade the sun and moon to shine and the dawn to break until he had harvested all of the herb himself. In this case, the star on this coin must represent Venus, the morning star. This unusual reverse type has sometimes been interpreted as an allegory for the victory of L. Cornelius Scipio—a famous ancestor of the moneyer Cn. Cornelius Sisena—over the Seleucid king Antiochus III at the Battle of Magnesia in 190 BC. In this interpretation, Scipio is represented by Jupiter and the defeated king by the anguipede giant.



After decades of providing the military backbone of Roman expansion, the Italic allies (socii in Latin) of Rome felt that they deserved more of the benefits than they had previously received. In short, they wanted Roman citizenship so that they would have a greater say in Rome's wars of conquest and changes to the system of land distribution that had concentrated vast swathes of arable land in the hands of the Roman elite. The disenchantment of the Italic socii with Rome came to a head in 91 BC, when M. Livius Drusus was murdered, probably through the agency of the consuls L. Marcius Philippus and Sextus Julius Caesar. He had been championing Italic rights and had drawn a large following as a means of forcing through a variety of social reforms in opposition to the consuls. This bloodshed sparked the Italic peoples, who may or may not have previously sworn an oath to be the protectors of Drusus, to give up their status as Roman allies and form an independent federal state known as the Italic Confederation with a capital at Corfinium, which was renamed Italica. Although the confederation included the Frentani, Hirpini, Iapygii, Lucanians, Marrucini, Marsi, Paeligni, Picentines, Pompeians, Samnites, Venusians, and Vestini, leadership was primarily in the hands of the Marsi and Samnites. Raising an army of 120,000 men, in 90 BC, the Italic consuls Q. Poppaedius Silo and C. Papius Mutilus and began a war against the Romans in the north and in the south, respectively. The Marsi defeated and killed P. Rutilius Lupus, the Roman consul sent against them, while at the same time, Mutilus made inroads into Campania, Lucania, and Apulia, drawing several additional cities and peoples into the Italic Confederacy. Although the Roman consul L. Julius Caesar, managed to roll back much of the Italic advance in the south, Rome remained in crisis. Fearing that other socii might break their alliances with Rome and join the rebels, Caesar enacted a law giving full rights of Roman citizenship to allied cities and peoples who had not already entered the Social War. In 89 BC, another law, the lex Plautia Papiria expanded Roman citizenship to any Italic ally who lay down his arms, in the hope of drawing support away from the Italic Confederacy. Everything began to fall apart for the Italic Confederation in 89 BC, despite the Marsic victory over the Roman consul L. Porcius Cato at the Battle of the Fucine Lake. Shortly thereafter, the Marsi suffered a series of defeats at the hands of Cato's colleague, C. Pompeius Strabo, and Sulla largely destroyed the forces of C. Papius Mutilus in Campania. In 88 BC, the war essentially came to an end when the Marsi were defeated and Q. Popaedius Silo killed at the Battle of the Teanus River. All that remained was for the Romans to mop up remaining pockets of resistance in Samnium in 87 BC. The Italic Confederation was no more, but at least part of its demands had been met and Rome would be more careful with its allies in the future. The denarii of the Italic Confederation struck during the Social War are notable for their close imitation of Roman denarii with the usual legend ROMA replaced by ITALIA in Oscan script. Somewhat ironically, this particular coin imitates a Roman Republican issue featuring the Dioscuri on the reverse. These gods were venerated by the Romans for their miraculous appearance at the Battle of Lake Regillus in 509 BC. This battle ended in Roman victory over the neighbouring Latins and the expelled Etruscan king L. Tarquinius Superbus. It seems a little unexpected to employ types related to a Roman victory over surrounding Italic peoples at a time when the Italic peoples were rising up to strike against the Romans.

The types of this denarius reflect the torn character of the Italic socii between their desire to be equal partners with the Romans and their creation of an independent state ostensibly different from and opposed to the Roman state. The laureate head on the obverse is intended to represent Italia, the personification of the Italic peoples and the Italic Confederation. However, the legend naming her is given clearly in Latin script rather than in the Oscan script naturally used by the Marsi and Samnites. This usage illustrates how closely the issuers of the coinage felt bound to Roman numismatic custom, which commonly featured the head of Roma, the personification of Rome, with a label in Latin to identify her. The reverse type depicts an oath-taking scene in which eight men place their swords on a pig held by an attendant before sacrifice. This is a modified version of a Roman Republican type struck by the moneyer Ti. Veturius in 137 BC, which shows only two men swearing on a pig held by an attendant. The scene on the Roman denarius is thought to represent the oath taken by the Romans at the conclusion of the disastrous Battle of the Caudine Forks (321 BC), in which they promised to end hostilities against the Samnites and to return conquered Samnite territory. If this is the correct interpretation, it is a very interesting type to have been imitated for a Social War issue. Although the type was most probably adopted by the Italic Confederation to symbolise its members' oath to fight against Rome, the possible Caudine Forks association of the model suggests that it also could have been read as a representation of Roman infidelity (war later resumed against the Samnites and their land conquered despite the oath) or of Italic triumph (the oath at the Caudine Forks was imposed on the Romans by the Samnites).

This denarius features types similar to the preceding piece but features the helmeted head of Mars copied from the Republican model of Ti. Veturius on the obverse rather than the laureate head of Italia used on the preceding coin. The oath-taking scene on the reverse has also been reduced to four participants from the eight shown on the preceding denarius. A remarkable Oscan legend in the exergue names the Samnite consul C. Papius Mutilus, who served alongside the Marsic consul Q. Poppaedius Silo in 90 BC. Mutilus was primarily responsible for leading Italic forces in the southern theatre of the Social War (91-87 BC) and won some spectacular early victories, including the capture of Nola. Thanks to his policy of mercy towards defeated Romans, this victory alone gained him the defection of some 2,000 Roman soldiers. His intention was not to destroy the Romans, but only to force the Roman acceptance of the Italic peoples as equal partners in the Roman state. Despite the initial successes of Mutilus and the army he commanded, they suffered major defeats in Samnium at the hands of Sulla in 89 BC. The Samnite consul was injured in the fighting and he was forced to escape to Aeserna. By the end of 88 BC the war was all but over and some of the demands of the Italic peoples had been met. Mutilus became a Roman citizen under the lex Plautia Papiria and seems to have enjoyed some respect there for his fighting provess and wealth. These attributes may have contributed to his death a few years later in the Sullan proscriptions of 82 BC.

Lucius Cornelius Sulla, 138-78 BC, was from a a very wealthy but relatively undistinguished patrician family. He proved an exceptional general during the Social War (91-87 BC), defeating the Samnites in southern Italy, for which he was awarded a consulship. Shortly after the war's conclusion, Mithradates VI of Pontus, on one murderous night, had more than 80,000 Roman citizens residing in Asia Minor slaughtered. The Roman Senate, needing to respond with force promptly, gave the command to deal with Mithradates to the recent war hero, Sulla.Unfortunately, Marius, who had more experience than Sulla, wanted the command for himself, and through political maneuvering, obtained it. Sulla was forced

to flee Rome for his life, but his legions remained loyal to his cause, and they marched on Rome itself. Sulla was victorious, causing Marius to flee the city, after which Sulla marched east to confront Mithradates. Sulla was successful in forcing Mithradates from Greece, parts of which he had occupied, but his command expired and was transferred to the suffect consul, L. Valerius Flaccus. Flaccus was soon murdered in Bithynia by his own general, Gaius Fimbria, who nearly captured Mithradates, but infighting between him and Sulla allowed the Pontic king to evade capture. After concluding a peace agreement with Mithradates, Sulla went on to impose his authority over much of Asia Minor, and in the process extracted great wealth, which he then used to invade Italy once again (Marius had once again re-established his power in Rome). It was at this time that this beautiful denarius of Sulla was struck. The obverse portrays the head of Venus, Sulla's patron deity, with a small control letter behind, while the reverse depicts a cornucopiae – in this instance an attribute of Fortuna – with the attendant legend, EX S C ('by authority of the Roman Senate'), all within a laurel wreath. Sulla went on to establish a three-year dictatorship in Rome before eventually retiring from political life. While in office, he re-established the rule of the Senate, in essence, returning power to the wealthy.



This denarius belongs to a larger series struck by Q. Pomponius Musa featuring the head of Apollo on the obverse and the nine Muses or Hercules Musarum on the reverse. All of these types serve as visual puns on the cognomen of the moneyer. Apollo was the leader of the Muses, nine minor goddesses who presided over literature and the arts—particularly music and poetry and who judged the deadly music contest between the god and Marsyas. The Muse Calliope (literally meaning, "Beautiful-Voiced") is depicted on the reverse of this piece. Her province was that of epic poetry and general eloquence. In addition to her fame as the voice of inspiration behind such poetic luminaries as Homer and Virgil, Calliope was also the mother of Orpheus and Linus, two of the greatest mythological singers of all time. The song of Orpheus was so beautiful and powerful that it could defeat the enchantment of the Sirens' voices and soften the heart of Hades. Linus was the inventor of lyric song and was so appreciated by the gods that Hephaestus sang his music while engraving the shield of Achilles. Unfortunately, he came to a bad end when he taught music to Hercules. After criticising his form one too many times, the hero took his master's harp and killed him with it.

In a recent article written by Phil Davies and published in the Festscrhif dedicated to Rick Witschonke, the author maintains, with convincing arguments, the issues showing on the reverse a muse holding a square lyre (kithara) should be identified as Erato, while those holding a turtle-shell lyre on reverse and having the turtle symbol on obverse should be identified as Terpsichore. This obviously makes the coin with Erato on reverse less rare than previously thought. Nevertheless the issue Crawford 410/6 remains an extremely rare type as Erato is playing the kithara whereas the type where she is holding the lyre in one hand and the kithara in the other is a much more common type. To consider this type as simply a die variety, as made by some cataloguers but not from Phil Davis, is in our view a mistake. Like the preceding piece, this denarius also belongs to the thematic series of Q. Pompnius Musa, but here the goddess depicted on the reverse is Erato (literally meaning "Lovely"), the Muse of lyric poetry—especially love songs. Like her sister Muses, she was a daughter of Zeus and Mnemosyne (Memory) and recognised Apollo as leader. Details of her mythology are very limited, but she was important enough to be invoked by name at the beginning of the lost Greek love poem, Rhadine, and by Virgil at the opening of Book 7 of the Aeneid.

This coin follows the general theme of Q. Pomponius Musa's denarius series by depicting the Muse Polyhymnia (literally meaning "Many-Hymned") on the reverse. As one might guess, she was the patron of sacred poetry, but somewhat less obvious is her association with dance and pantomime. A spring sacred to Polyhymnia flowed from Mount Parnassos between two large rocks and into a basin at Delphi. Its waters were used there for oracular purposes by the priestess of

The Apollo and tripod types of types of this denarius are believed to refer to the Roman priestly college of the Quindacemviri sacris faciundis (literally, "Fifteen Men for doing Sacred Things"), to which the moneyer L. Torquatus is assumed to have belonged. The college actually began its existence as a duumvirate of two priests drawn from the patrician class, but in 367 BC the number of members was increased to fifteen with half to be drawn from patrician and half from the plebeian families. The duties of the Quindecemviri were focused on the protection and interpretation of the Sibylline Books, a series of written oracles obtained from the famous Sibyl of Cumae, but they also had responsibility for overseeing the worship of foreign gods introduced to Rome and of interpreting omens. The depiction of Apollo and his mantic tripod on this coin refer to his role as the god from whom the oracles of the Sibylline Books were believed to come. The laurel wreath used as a border on the reverse is a modification of the traditional torque or neck-ring used in similar fashion on earlier coins struck by Torquati serving as moneyers. The torque was a visual allusion to the cognomen Torquatus, but here it is composed of the laurel leaves sacred to Apollo.

The identity of the moneyer C. Considius Nonianus is entirely unknown, but it has been suggested that the types of this denarius related to Venus Erycinus might indicate Sullan political leanings. Sulla had generally claimed to have the special favour of Venus while the Battle of the Colline Gate, which resulted in his final victory over the Marian faction, on 1 November 82, had taken place near the temple of Venus Erycinus in Rome. The cult of Venus Erycinus, derived from an indigenous Elymian settlement on Mount Eryx in Sicily, was introduced to the Romans during the First Punic War (264-241 BC).) The Elymians were generally believed by the Romans to have been descendants of the Trojans and are mentioned as compatriots of Aeneas by Virgil. Although the historical Elymian settlement was destroyed by the Carthaginians in 260 BC, the temple of the goddess atop the mountain was later captured by the Romans and held firm until the end of the First Punic War against the repeated attempts of Hamilcar Barca to dislodge them.

The bearded head depicted on the obverse of this denarius is clearly identified as Quirinus, a Sabine war deity assimilated by the early Romans. His name is variously understood by the ancient authorities as derived from the Sabine word quires

("spear") or from the town of Cures. Whatever the case, the Quirinal Hill of Rome is named after him. For unknown reasons, by the end of the first century BC, Quirinus was recognised as the deified form of Romulus, the founder of Rome. The reverse type and legend celebrate the deeds of an ancestor of the moneyer C. Memmius—an obscure Memmius, who is said to have introduced the Cerialia festival while holding the office of aedile. This festival honoured the Roman grain goddess, Ceres, who is depicted here, and was annually held on April 12-18. By 175 BC, the Cerialia involved three major sets of ludi, or games: the ludi Cerialis, which involved women carrying lighted torches running around in imitation of Ceres' search for her lost daughter Proserpina; the ludi circenses, which involved horse races and other events at the circus; and the ludi scaenici, which involved theatrical performances of religious significance. Although the legend on the coin gives the impression that Memmius the aedile was the founder of the entire Cerealia, sometimes leading to accusations that C. Memmius has fabricated a glorious plebeian ancestor for himself, it is believed that the aedile was responsible for adding the ludi scaenici to the games already associated with the Cerialia. In this case C. Memmius is only guilty of embellishment, rather than complete fabrication.

This denarius, issued by M. Junius Brutus, the man who would strike down Julius Caesar a decade later, strongly advertises his love of the Roman Republic that Caesar's actions were calculated to subvert. The obverse features the portrait of his namesake, the legendary L. Junius Brutus, who used the outrage of the rape of Lucretia to raise a popular revolt in Rome to expel the city's last Etruscan king, L. Tarquinius Superbus in 509 BC. With Superbus gone from the city and the kingship abolished, Brutus then set about creating a republican form of government led by two annually-elected supreme magistrates responsible for issues of war and peace known as consuls. Brutus was elected consul for the first year of the Republic alongside L. Tarquinius Collatinus, the bereaved husband of Lucretia. As if it was not enough that M. Junius Brutus could claim descent from the very founder of the Roman Republic, the portrait on the reverse illustrated his birth claim to descent from the C. Servilius Ahala. In 439 BC, Ahala was appointed magister equitum during the dictatorship of L. Quinctius Cincinnatus. This extraordinary magistracy was deemed necessary by the Roman patricians out of fear that the wealthy plebeian Spurius Maelius was plotting to overthrow the state and become king. After the appointment of the dictator, Ahala was charged with bringing Maelius before Cincinnatus to give an account of his actions. Maelius, reasonably fearing for his life, refused to come with Ahala and fled into the assembled crowd, but he was struck down by Ahala's dagger. Later etymological tradition claimed that the dagger was concealed in Ahala's armpit and was the source of his cognomen. Considering M. Junius Brutus' motivation in leading the assassination plot against Caesar, it almost sends a chill up the spine to see that he was telegraphing what was to come through his coin types. Unfortunately, history had progressed too far and the Republic become too corrupt by the time he took it upon himself to relive the legends of Brutus and Ahala and his actions did not bring about a renewal of the state so much as they hasten it ultimate destruction

Among the towering figures of the late Republic was Gnaeus Pompeius, better known as Pompey 'the Great', who by his mid-20s had already earned his surname Magnus. Alongside his father Pompeius Strabo, and later in alliance with the warlord Sulla, Pompey lived in the eye of the storm that challenged the authority of the Senate. Time and time again Pompey (like his father) defied the Senate's requests to disband his armies. He was a merciless commander, crushing remnants of the Marian party in North Africa, fighting the rebel Sertorius in Spain, crushing the slave-army of Spartacus in Southern Italy, cleansing the eastern Mediterranean of pirates, and delivering the final defeat to Rome's great enemy in Asia, Mithradates VI of Pontus. After his great successes in Asia, Pompey joined Crassus and Julius Caesar to form the First Triumvirate in 60 B.C., which remained intact until 53, when Crassus died in battle against the Parthians. Soon Pompey found himself allied with the Senate against Caesar, which resulted in Caesar crossing the Rubicon in 49, forcing Pompey and his allies to flee to Greece. In the following year their conflict shifted to Greek soil, at Pharsalus, where Pompey was defeated in the famous battle, after which he fled to Egypt and was swiftly murdered. This rare denarius was struck by Pompey's eldest son, Pompey Junior, presumably at the Spanish mint of Corduba shortly before the Battle of Munda on March 17, 45. At this battle the Pompeians suffered another crushing defeat to Julius Caesar. With the possible exception of civic bronzes of Soli-Pompeiopolis in Cilicia, no portrait of Pompey appears on coinage until after his death, thus making the series to which this coin belongs his first securely dateable portrait coins.

Sextus Pompeius was the youngest son of Pompey the Great. After his father was defeated by Julius Caesar at the Battle of Pharsalus (48 B.C.), he joined him on Lesbos before they both fled to Egypt. The young Sextus was horrified when his father stepped off the boat at Alexandria and was promptly killed. He then joined his brother Gnaeus and senators opposed to Caesar in North Africa, but when Caesar's advance showed that resistance in the region would be crushed, the brothers escaped to Hispania. There they were defeated by Caesar at the Battle of Munda (45 B.C.), marking the end of the Caesarean civil war. Gnaeus Pompeius was captured and executed for his dogged opposition, but Sextus again escaped. Moving on to Sicily, Sextus Pompeius used the island as a base for raising an army and a fleet with which to challenge the heirs of Caesar. Despite attempts by the triumvirs to evict him, Sextus remained strong in Sicily, even managing to capture Sardinia from Octavian in 40 B.C. In the following year, Sextus and the triumvirs agreed to the Pact of Misenum, which recognised his authority in Sicily, Sardinia, Corsica, and the Peloponnesus. This settlement fell apart shortly thereafter, but Sextus handily defeated a fleet commanded by Octavian at the Battle of Messina in 37 B.C. He was worsted in 36 B.C., when Octavian's admiral, Marcus Agrippa, and the triumvir Marcus Lepidus defeated him first at Mylae and then at Naulochus. With Sicily invaded and his fleet destroyed, Sextus Pompeius fled to Asia Minor, where he was hunted down and executed in 35 B.C. This early denarius of Sextus Pompeius advertises his relationship to his father in much the same way that the coins of Octavian made much of his adoptive father, Julius Caesar. For both men, their connections to their fathers were pathways to legitimacy and power. Here the portrait of the dead Pompey the Great appears on the obverse surrounded by a Latin legend that gives Sextus his father's title, Magnus ("the Great"), purposely blurring the distinction between father and son. The portrait obverse should also be read in connection with the reverse depiction of Pietas, illustrating Sextus Pompeius' filial respect and sense of duty towards the memory of his father.

The reverse of this denarius is famous and controversial. According to one interpretation, it represents Sulla lying asleep and dreaming with the contents of his dream standing around him. Plutarch tells us that before Sulla's infamous march on Rome in 88 BC, "there appeared in his dreams a goddess whom the Romans learned to worship from the Cappadocians, whether she is Luna, or Minerva, or Bellona. This goddess, as Sulla fancied, stood by his side and put into his hand a thunder-bolt, and naming his enemies one by one, bade him smite them with it; and they were all smitten, and fell, and vanished away. Encouraged by the vision, he told it to his colleague, and at break of day led on towards Rome." Luna, clearly identified by a crescent on her forehead, stands before the sleeping figure on the right while Victory stands behind him on the left. Both seem to represent elements of the dream as recorded by Plutarch. However, the use of Sulla's dream as a type by L. Aemilius Buca has been challenged on the grounds that he was an appointee of Julius Caesar and therefore linked to the populares political faction of Rome, while Sulla is thought to have become virtually an emblem of the opposition optimate faction. On the assumption that Sulla's dream was politically inappropriate, the type is instead understood to represent the myth of Endymion, a young Greek shepherd who was beloved by Selene (Roman Luna) that she begged Zeus to permit him to retain his youth and sleep forever so that she could look upon him every night. While this interpretation explains the sleeping figure and the presence of Luna, it does not easily account for Victory. She has little to do with the Endymion myth, but a great deal to do with Sulla. This fact, combined with increasing understanding that the populares and optimates were not the same as modern political parties and lacked unified policies and ideologies, makes it seem more likely that the dream of Sulla is indeed represented here.

This coin marks the beginning of the monarchical behaviour that would cause many members of the senatorial class to turn against Julius Caesar and assassinate him on the Ides of March. The Romans were long opposed to all trappings of kingship both in memory of the expulsion of Tarquinius Superbus, which allowed for the creation of the Roman Republic, and as a practical means of preventing the subversion of that republic. As a feature of this old anti-regal policy, it was Roman custom to never depict a living man on their coins, because this would be too much like the practices of contemporary Hellenistic kings. It was therefore very shocking to the public, and especially individuals of strong republican sentiment, when denarii like this began coming out of the mint in early 44 BC. The obverse is a clear portrait of Caesar as dictator for the fourth time executed in an excellent veristic style that does not shy away from representing his physical flaws. Due to the quality of its execution, this is probably the most desirable issue of all of Caesar's portrait coins. The dictator is shown here with the corona aurea awarded for his triumphs, but which he took to wearing at all times to cover up his increasing baldness. A lituus, the staff of the augur, appears behind the neck specifically advertises his appointment as a member of the college of augurs in 47 BC, but may also allude in more general terms to Caesar's religious roles. He had been pontifex in 73 BC and previous religious positions as pontifex maximus in 63 BC, and showed a great interest in using his sacred roles as a means of bolstering the legitimacy of his sole rule. The reverse type features Juno Sospita and represents the influence of the moneyer M. Mettius on the coin design. Juno Sospita ("the Saviour") was a form of the important goddess that was especially venerated in the Latin city of Lanuvium, the ancestral home of the gens Mettia. She was adopted into the Roman pantheon early on and had her own temple on the Palatine Hill in the fourth century BC. This nod to Mettius' family represents a last gasp for traditional moneyers as types related to Caesar came to dominate both sides of the coins. The disappearance of moneyers' influence on Roman coins only accelerated after his death and the coming of the civil wars resulting the creation of the Empire.

The early career of Julius Caesar, certainly the most famous of all Romans, was far from remarkable. He followed the standard cursus honorum of a nobleman, and had he not been struck by great ambition in his 31st year, he may have been little more than a footnote in history. Caesarís moment of clarity seems to have occurred while serving as a quaestor in Spain: he gazed upon a statue of Alexander the Great, who by age 31 had already conquered Greece and the Persian Empire. Within a few years Caesar had joined Crassus in a populist movement against the nobility, and a decade later was consul. From there his career spiralled to ever-rising heights, including the pacification of Gaul, the defeat of Pompey Magnus at Pharsalus, and receiving the unprecedented title dictator perpetuus from the Senate. However, shortly before he was to ask for the title of king in advance of his campaign against Parthia (for the Sibylline Books prophesied that only a king could conquer Parthia), Caesar was murdered by a group of senators led by Brutus and Cassius. So ended Caesar's life, but not his legacy, which was carried forth by Marc Antony and Octavian, and which survived in the form of the Julio-Claudians dynasty and the first six emperors of Rome. The peculiarity of the Roman monetary portraiture of this period lies in the absolutely realistic reproduction of the likeness of the personality portrayed. Julius Caesar is one of the first, if not the first, Roman who, while living, had himself immortalised on coins (excluding T. Quinctius Flaminius). The coins with the effigy of Julius Caesar alive are of easy and certain dating. Even though done by several artists, they show with different personal styles a faithful image of the general. On the specimen here offered, work of a highly talented engraver, preserved to perfection and well struck, are evident the folds of the neck that obliquely cover the sternocleidomastoid muscle, falling in parallel lines, and a vertical wrinkledness that clearly underlines the laryngo-thyroidal lump; moreover, an accentuation of the orbicular musculature of the mouth, matched by the prominence of the zygomatic arch. These observations are due to Sergio Macchi, a well-known and skilled doctor from Lugano, scholar of coins of the Roman Republic, who in an interesting article privately published but deserving to be brought out again in a widely-circulated numismatic review, starting from the monetary portrayals of Caesar, also supported with a new and more convincing interpretation of the historical sources, has come to the conclusion that the leader, at the time of the mintage of the coins, was suffering from a terminal abdominal tumour. This fascinating and intriguing hypothesis casts a new light upon those tormented times and the coin we offer here is one of the most palpable evidence.

This denarius, struck in March 44 BC, shortly before the fatal Ides, builds on the themes of the preceding coin. Here, the portrait of Caesar is again depicted in a veristic style, but his head is shown veiled to emphasise the sacred character of the dictator-now empowered for life, as indicated by the legend DICT PERPETVO. The element of the veil again alludes to his status as a member of the college of augurs. According to Roman religious custom, the augurs veiled their heads while divining the will of the gods from observing the flight of birds in the air or their movements on the ground. This was done so that the augur could only see ahead of him and would not risk the possibility of catching a glimpse of an ill omen out of the corner of his eye. This use of religious imagery in the service of politics pioneered by Caesar would be used much more deftly by his adoptive heir, Octavian, especially in his role as Augustus, the first of the Roman emperors. The reverse type illustrates the repression of moneyers' influence on the coinage in favour of Caesarean iconography. Although the legend names the moneyer P. Sepullius Macer, the type depicts Venus Victrix, a goddess closely associated with the gens Iulia and with the personal successes of Julius Caesar. The Julian family claimed its descent from Aeneas and Venus and Caesar had vowed a temple to Venus Victrix in return for victory over Pompey at the Battle of Pharsalus on 9 August 48 BC. However, in the aftermath of his victory over the Pompeians, Cesar instead opted to build the temple in honour of Venus as Genetrix, the originator of the gens Iulia. The temple was dedicated at the conclusion of Caesar's great triumph on 26 September 46 BC. Unfortunately, Julius Caesar did not live to see the temple and its associated forum completed. It remained unfinished at the time of assassination and was only finished by Octavian as an act of filial piety.

This coin, struck by the moneyer C. Cossutius Maridianus, in February or early March of 44 BC, further shows the monarchic-style domination of Julius Caesar over contemporary Roman coinage. Whereas previously the individual moneyers had advertised mythological figures connected to their families or the real or imagined great deeds of famous ancestors, now the types revolved entirely around Caesar and his iconography. The types here are almost identical to those of the preceding denarius of P. Sepullius Macer. A veristic portrait of Cesar again appears on the obverse with a veil pulled over his head as if representing him in the act of taking the auspices. The surrounding legend also names Caesar as dictator for life, but is slightly longer winded in its expression, preferring DICT IN PERPETVO to Macer's more succinct DICT PERPETVO. Also, like the Macer denarius, the issue of Maridianus depicts Venus Victrix on the reverse to allude to Caesar's divine ancestry and to his victory over the opposition at Pharsalus. However, here the moneyer has taken the representation of the goddess a step further in advancing Caesar's ambition of becoming a new Roman king. On the Macer issue Venus is shown in a traditional manner, probably imitating a statue, in which she holds a figure of Victory in her right hand and rests her left on the shield of her lover, the war god Mars. Maridianus features a similar Venus Victrix, but now the shield is set atop a globe, indicating her rule over the cosmos and the universal power of Caesar. The addition of the globe clearly advertises a Rome and its empire firmly under the authority of the gens Iulia in the person of the dictator. One-man rule in Rome was here to stay and Caesar was not shy about flaunting it. It is hardly surprising that with such outrageous claims even his former friends turned against him and plotted his death several weeks after this coin was

After the murder of Caesar on the Ides of March 44 BC, Rome was turned upside down. M. Junius Brutus, C. Cassius Longinus and the other Liberators believed that their act would be seen as the freeing of Rome from the tyranny of a would-be king and that they would be welcomed. They were shown to be wrong when the common people, many of whom had benefited from Caesar's largesse, rose up and burned down the Senate House. Two days later, Mark Antony, Caesar's lieutenant and leader of the Caesarean faction in Rome, offered a compromise to the Liberators in which they would not be punished but all of Caesar's political appointments would remain valid. This settlement avoided an immediate collapse of the government and allowed Antony time to marshal the Caesarean forces that were left reeling by the death of Julius Caesar. At Caesar's funeral, held on 20 March BC, Antony gave a speech that stirred public anger against the Liberators to such a degree that they soon decided that it was safer for them to leave Rome and Italy entirely. This denarius was struck by Antony not long after in the context of games included in the Paralia festival celebrated on 21 April 44 BC. The games were introduced to the festival to celebrate Caesar's final victory over the Pompeian faction at the Battle of Munda (17 March 45 BC) and were used to further focus public sentiment against his murderers. The reverse type depicts a rider whipping his horse into a frenzy of speed while a second horse gallops beside. This individual is known by the Latin technical term desultor, which refers to a popular type of acrobat who leaped from one horse to another at high speed. Roman desultores plied their trade in the circus to the amazement of the crowds and were easily recognised by the distinctive tall felt caps (clearly visible here) that they wore. The desultor here is thought to represent a participant in the Antony's games at the Paralia.

With his father and brother having been executed after battles with Julius Caesar, Sextus Pompey found himself at the helm of the Pompeian cause. In addition to his own military talents and some support in the senate, Sextus called upon another resource for survival – his family legacy. Perhaps the best evidence for his use of family ties to legitimise his own position can be found on coinage, for he was the first Roman to use dynastic imagery in that manner. This issue of denarii

is one example. Sextus Pompey's coinage bearing the name of his naval commander O. Nasidius is among the most attractive of the Imperatorial era. It consists of two major types: the first shows the right-facing head of the deceased Pompey Magnus and a galley, the second shows a left-facing head of Pompey and a scene of four galleys about to meet in battle. The first type is relatively plentiful, the second is a great rarity, and we may add to them an extremely rare hybrid issue, which pairs the obverse of the second with the reverse of the first. The portrait of Pompey Magnus is engraved with a near-perfect balance of realism and idealism, resulting in a powerful image that must have rallied support among the remaining Pompeian sympathisers. The inscription NEPTVNI, which seemingly abbreviates Neptuni filius ("the son of Neptune"), likely refers to the deceased Pompey, for Sextus apparently did not claim to be the son of the sea-god until after his second major naval victory over Octavian in 38 B.C. (at which Appian says Nasidius served as one of Sextus' admirals). The occasion for these coinages is not clear. Grueber and Sydenham both suggested they were struck in Sicily, whereas Crawford considers them to have been struck at a mint moving with Sextus Pompey while en route to Sicily. Sear proposes they were struck at Massalia during Sextus' visitation. Sydenham and Grueber assigned them to 38-36 B.C., Crawford and Sear place them in 44-43 B.C., and they often are assigned elsewhere to 42-38 B.C. Thus, there are three distinct ideas on dating which, collectively, cover the length of his independent career. One aspect to note is that the coinage does not bear the title 'Commander-in-chief of the Fleet and of the Sea Coasts' that he received from the senate in April of 43 B.C. The naval commander Nasidius had long been loyal to the Pompeians. In 49 B.C. he attempted to break the siege of Massalia by Julius Caesar's legate Decimus Brutus and afterward he held a command in the Pompeian fleet in North Africa. He then joined the forces that Pompey Junior had assembled in Spain after the Battle of Thapsus. As these coins clearly show, Nasidius sailed with Sextus Pompey afterward, though he eventually joined Marc Antony as an admiral in his eastern fleet. Nasidius took part in the disaster at Actium, after which nothing further is heard of his life or career.

Caius Antonius had long been active in Caesarean politics, and he became deeply entrenched in the years 44 to 42 B.C. In 44 he was elected to the priestly college of the pontifices through the efforts of Julius Caesar, and after the dictator's murder he worked tirelessly to secure his brother Marc Antony's authority in Rome. Though he comes across as an unfortunate soul, Caius must have been ambitious, for he did not reject his brother's effort to get him appointed governor of Macedon late in November, 44 B.C. – an act that amounted to a direct challenge to Brutus, who already occupied the region. Brutus defended Macedon by blockading Caius at the port of Apollonia in March, 43. He was able to convince Caius' armies at Dyrrhachium and Apollonia to desert to his side, and through vigorous action he was able to keep Caius at bay until he surrendered. However, the worst was yet to come. As tensions continued to rise between the two factions, the Caesareans executed the orator Cicero. This silenced one of the great outspoken voices against the Caesareans, but it also seemed to result in the execution of Caius Antonius, who was still in captivity at that time. Caius' death not only sent a message to the supporters of Antony and Octavian, but it must have assuaged Marcus Tullius Cicero, the son of the orator, who had fought valiantly for Brutus during the siege of Caius' armies in Apollonia. Beyond these historical accounts, little remains to testify to the life of Caius, except this small issue of denarii, presumably struck in 43 B.C. at a mint travelling with him in Illyricum.

Few portraits of Julius Caesar are as well-executed as those on this issue of 43 B.C. by the moneyer L. Flaminius Chilo. It is obvious even to the untrained eye that special care was taken in the engraving of Caesar's portrait. This must have involved considerable effort, especially since the earlier Caesar portraits of 44 B.C. often are of such poor quality. The demands that such an improvement in artistry would have placed on the engravers at the Rome mint likely were difficult to meet. For this reason, it is suspected that these denarii could not have been created until after Octavian had arrived in Rome late in the summer of 43 B.C., and had secured his position. Crawford notes that the identity of the rather ambiguous god on the reverse is not certain, though it likely is Venus or Pax. In either case, he reasons that the sceptre represents dominion and the caduceus symbolises Felicitas. The other denarius type of this moneyer is equally pro-Caesarean, as it pairs a head of Venus Victrix with Victory in a biga.





Plutarch held Cassius in low regard, describing him as a man who was not well liked and who ruled his soldiers through fear. He says: "...Cassius was known to be a man of violent and uncontrolled passions, whose craving for money had often tempted him to stray from the path of justice, and it therefore seemed natural that his motive for fighting, wandering about the empire and risking his life was not to win liberty for his fellow-countrymen, but to secure some great place for himself." Plutarch has precisely the opposite to say of Cassius' co-conspirator: "Brutus' virtues, on the other hand, made him popular with the rank and file, beloved by his friends, and admired by the nobility, while even his enemies found it impossible to hate him." With this in mind one can imagine the simmering conflict between the two leaders, with Cassius being increasingly resentful of Brutus' popularity while he himself suffered from doing the lion's share of the hard work, regardless of how it tarnished his reputation. In point of truth, their rivalry was no less significant than the one being experienced by their opponents, Marc Antony and Octavian. By the time they met at Sardis and were hailed imperator by their troops, the strains of partnership reached an intolerable pitch. Plutarch states: "...as often happens in great enterprises in which a large number of friends and commanders are engaged, there had been some sharp differences and mutual accusations had been exchanged. So...their first action was to meet in a room face to face. The doors were shut, and with no one else present the two men first began blaming one another and then fell to recriminations and counter-charges. These soon led to indignant reproaches and tears, and their friends, who were amazed at the vehemence and bitterness of their anger, were afraid that the quarrel might end in violence." This confrontation occurred just before Brutus departed to campaign disastrously in Lycia and Cassius set out to capture Rhodes, which he did successfully, but with extreme severity. We may be sure this denarius was struck after Cassius' defeat of the Rhodians, for the reverse depicts an aplustre, a ship ornament that symbolised naval victory. The flowers at the extremities of the ornament suggest Rhodes since the rose had been the symbol of that island for many centuries. Its symbolism is sealed when the other issue of this legate is considered: it shows a crab holding an aplustre in its claws, above a loose diadem and a rose. This rose is a certain reference to Rhodes, and it appears below the crab, the badge of the island of Cos, near where the decisive battle took place. The loosened diadem might symbolise the kingship Cassius claimed to have undone at Rhodes (Plutarch, Brutus, 30) or it could be a reference to the undoing of Julius Caesar's tyranny some two years before.

Alongside Brutus, C. Cassius Longinus was a leading figure in the plot to assassinate Julius Caesar. However, things did not quite go according to plan. While the so-called Liberators had imagined that the removal of Caesar would allow for the full restoration of the Roman Republic under the leadership of the senatorial class, they had not counted on the admiration of the general public for the dictator and the ability of his legal and political heirs, Octavian and Mark Antony, to turn the people of Rome against them. Realising that the situation was rapidly deteriorating for Caesar's assassins in Italy, most of the Liberators, including Cassius took up provincial posts in the East in order to build the war chests and legions that would be needed for their inevitable final showdown with the Caesareans. Cassius first went to Syria, where he was well known from his previous tenure there as governor in 53-2 BC, in order to raise money before proceeding to Asia Minor to link up with Brutus. This extremely rare denarius type was struck in the names of Cassius and his legate M. Servilius at a military mint moving with Cassius and Brutus in 42 BC. It was probably produced when Cassius and Brutus met for the last time at Sardis before embarking on the fateful Philippi campaign. The obverse type depicts Libertas, the Roman personification of freedom, who was deemed to have been restored to the Roman people with each dagger blow of Caesar's assassins. The reverse symbolically celebrates Cassius' capture of the wealthy trading city of Rhodes. The Rhodians (symbolised here by the well-known rose badge of their city), a long established their naval power, had attempted to prevent the Liberator's plunder of their island city by challenging him at sea between Myndos and the island of Cos (whose civic badge was a crab), they were soundly defeated by the forces of Cassius, which had long been training for the battle. The victory of Cassius is here indicated by the aplustre (the cut-off stern post of a war galley) held in the claws of the Coan crab. Upon his entry to Rhodes, the fearful Rhodians are said to have hailed Cassius as their "lord and king." He, however, refused to accept this title, reportedly responding, I am neither lord and king, but I have punished the man who would have been both." This denial of kingship is indicated by the untied royal diadem depicted fallen to the ground above the Rhodian rose. Interestingly, while Cassius denied that he would be a king, he made no similar denial about being a thief. Once he had entered Rhodes, he plundered the city of some 8,000 talents to be used in financing the coming war against Octavian and Antony. It is not impossible that coins such as this were actually produced from the silver carried off from the island city.

This denarius was struck by a mobile military mint moving with Brutus and his army in the months leading up to the Battle of Philippi (October 42 BC). Sear has suggested that it may have been produced at Sardis on the occasion of the second meeting of Brutus with Cassius, his co-conspirator in the assassination of Julius Caesar on 15 March 44 BC. Although this meeting was marred by mutual suspicion, the two men ultimately agreed to join their forces and together march west against the Second Triumvirate. The obverse type features the laureate head of Libertas, the Roman personification of liberty and freedom. The type refers to the role of Brutus in the murder of Caesar and in freeing (for a short time) the Roman people from the threat of the return of hated monarchy to their city. Brutus and his associates frequently invoked Libertas on their coinages and habitually described themselves as the Liberatores. The trophy on the reverse serves to advertise the recent victories of Brutus, accompanied by his legate M. Servilius, while campaigning in Lycia. Brutus had demanded money and soldiers from the cities of the Lycian League to bolster his forces for the looming confrontation with the armies of the Second Triumvirate, but when they were not forthcoming he plundered the capital at Xanthus and other Lycian cities, reportedly making himself "tremendously rich." The silver used to strike this denarius may very well have been carried off from Lycia by Brutus' forces.

Unlike many of his other denarius issues, which pay homage to the deeds of his arch-Republican ancestor, L. Junius Brutus, or to his actions as a leading figure in the assassination of Julius Caesar, this issue of the Liberator M. Junius Brutus seems to look forward to the expected outcome of the imminent Battle of Philippi (3 and 23 October 42 BC). The reverse type dramatically shows Victory trampling on a broken sceptre while she tears a royal diadem in her hands. This representation illustrates the belief (or hope) that the forces of the Liberators would achieve a victory that would destroy the Caesareans and the hated trappings of monarchy promoted by the dead dictator. One wonders whether the diadem and the sceptre might have been intended to represent the two leading figures of the Caesarean faction, Octavian and Mark Antony, broken by the victory of the Liberators and their republican ideals. The obverse names P. Servilius Casca Longus, one of Caesar's assassins and the man appointed to command Brutus' fleet. The associated type depicting the head of Neptune with his trident has sometimes been interpreted as an allusion to Cassius' earlier victory over the Rhodian fleet, but this seems somewhat unlikely considering that Casca was Brutus' man and had no personal involvement in the capture of Rhodes. The type is much more likely to have been intended to advertise Casca's important naval command and the power of Brutus' fleet on the eve of Philippi. Unfortunately for Brutus, while the ships of the Liberators were far more numerous than those of the Caesareans and could dominate the sea, this naval superiority could not help them win the land battle necessary for the Republican cause to triumph. After suffering defeat and retaining only four legions on 23 October 42 BC, Brutus gave up all hope of a future victory like the one depicted on this coin and fell on his own sword.

This splendid denarius of Brutus was struck in either western Asia Minor or northern Greece shortly before the decisive Battle of Philippi in October 42 B.C., which ended the Republican cause led by Brutus and Cassius when their forces were defeated by the combined armies of the triumvirs Octavian and Mark Antony. Both of the imperators committed suicide on the field – Cassius in early October when he mistakenly thought Brutus had been defeated, and Brutus after a second

engagement later in the month when it became apparent that the Republican cause was lost - which left the Roman world firmly in the hands of the Second Triumvirate. This coin was struck under the authority of the quaestor (or perhaps proquaestor) L. Plaetorius Cestianus, who was also responsible for Brutus's final issue, the renowned Eid Mar denarius depicting the portrait of the imperator on the obverse and the cap of liberty between two daggers along with the legend commemorating the date of Caesar's assassination on the reverse. The obverse here depicts a veiled and wreathed female with a polos, or cylindrical crown, atop her head, the die wonderfully executed with remarkable skill and beauty. Although traditionally the portrait has been thought to depict the Roman goddess Ceres, Crawford in RRC called into question this identification and suggested that the figure may be Diana instead. Crawford's suggestion seems unlikely, however, and indeed here we maintain the traditional attribution. Ceres was often used in Roman coinage to appeal to plebeian interests, especially as she was the divine protectress of the Roman grain supply (frumentarium). Here she perhaps has also a regenerative role in the liberator's cause of restoring the Republic from the depredations of Caesar's dictatorship. The reverse recalls Brutus's membership in Rome's most senior priesthood, the pontifices, the office only gained with Caesar's direct support. The axe and culullus (a horn-shaped drinking vessel used in Roman religious rites) were used by the priests during the sacrifice of a white ox, and in art are emblems of the priesthood, the notion here to connect Brutus' priestly duties with his cause thereby suggesting divine righteousness.

The career of Lucius Staius Murcus, like that of so many commanders of the Imperatorial age, is not well documented. He seems to have been one of the more gifted military minds of his age, and it is clear from coinage that he was hailed Imperator, though the occasion is not recorded. Equally elusive are the circumstances under which he struck his coins, all of which provide ample ground for speculation. According to Appian, Murcus did not participate in the murder of Julius Caesar, whom he had served as a legate, yet he was at that meeting where Caesar was killed and was among the first to raise their swords in defence of the assassins. Soon afterward, Murcus went to Syria as the designated proconsul of 44 B.C. He brought with him three legions to restore order in the wake of a rebellion that had broken among the Syrian army under the leadership of the ex-Pompeian Q. Caecilius Bassus. Accounts vary, but it would appear that Murcus and the governor of Bithynia, Q. Marcius Crispus, joined forces to besiege Bassus in the stronghold of Apameia. The stalemate was resolved only when Cassius - who, with Brutus, was now preparing for war against the Caesarians - negotiated to acquire all of the legions for his Republican cause: three each from Murcus and Crispus, and one or two from Bassus. In return for his legions and his change of loyalty, Murcus received a command position in Cassius' fleet. Murcus may have taken part in the infamous siege of Rhodes in the spring of 42, and soon afterward was entrusted with an important mission. He sailed with a large force to the southern tip of the Peloponnesus, where he was to intercept a fleet that Queen Cleopatra VII was leading westward to aid Antony and Octavian. But the two forces never met, as most of Cleopatra's fleet was destroyed in a gale, and Murcus could do little more than survey the wreckage. His original mission now scrapped, Murcus engaged in some looting in the Peloponnesus before sailing further westward to the Italian port of Brundisium, where he began to blockade Antony's effort to transport troops and supplies to Macedon. He performed well against the under-supplied Antony until Octavian arrived with ships from Sicily. Thereafter, a great many vessels slipped through and Murcus' efforts were of little value until Cassius reinforced him with a fleet of warships and auxiliary vessels under the command of Ahenobarbus. The enlarged blockade proved effective, and remained in force until the Battle of Philippi. Indeed, on the very day of the battle, Murcus and Ahenobarbus had their greatest success by intercepting a transport of soldiers and supplies under the command of Calvinus. The loss of those Caesarean reinforcements - on the day their comrades had triumphed at Philippi - was disheartening; many vessels and seasoned soldiers were lost in the Adriatic. After learning that Brutus and Cassius were dead, and their armies defeated, Murcus and some Republican refugees gathered and eventually sailed westward to Sicily to join the ranks of Sextus Pompey. In doing so, he greatly enlarged the number of ships and soldiers at the rebel's disposal, and added a substantial sum of money to his coffers. It was perhaps in this period of uncertainty between Philippi and his joining Pompey, when Murcus was commander of a fleet without a cause, that he struck his denarii. If we subscribe to Appian's view, the loyalty and support of Murcus was rewarded only by Pompey's growing suspicion and envy. It is equally likely that Murcus demanded to play a more prominent role in affairs, and that Pompey feared the consequences of sharing that much authority. In either case, it appears that Pompey began to suspect his comrade's motives, and isolated him from command decisions so plainly that by 39 an irreparable rift had developed. When Murcus took a leave of absence to Syracuse that same year he was murdered by men in the service of Pompey.

After the assassination of Julius Caesar on the Ides of March 44 BC, the Senate entered into negotiations with Sextus Pompey, a son of Pompey the Great, who still retained a significant army and fleet after Caesar's defeat of the Pompeian

forces in Spain at the Battle of Munda in 45 BC. In April 43 BC the Senate had granted him the title of praefectus classis et orae maritimae (Prefect of the Fleet and Sea Shores), which is employed on the reverse of this denarius. By August, the political winds had drastically changed at Rome and at the instigation of Octavian and Sextus was named as a public enemy. He responded using his fleet to rescue fugitives from the bloody Caesarean proscriptions in Rome and took control of Sicily to serve as a base of operations for blockading Italy and launching raids on its coastline. In 42 BC, Octavian's general, Q. Salvidienus Rufus, attempted to invade Sicily and expel Sextus, but he was defeated. Sextus replied in 40 BC by using his naval forces to seize the island of Sardinia from Octavian's governor. By this time, he had shown himself to be so well-entrenched in Sicily and so dangerous to Rome through his continued blockade that in 39 BC, the triumvirate of Octavian, Mark Antony, and Marcus Lepidus, attempted to make peace with him by agreeing to the Pact of Misenum. This settlement recognised Sextus Pompey as the legitimate governor of Sicily and Sardinia as well as Corsica and the Peloponnesos while at the same time promising him a future augurate and consulship in 33 BC. In return, he was to end the blockade and supply Rome with grain. Sextus happily agreed to the terms of the pact, but it really only represented a temporary truce. In 38 BC, Octavian accused Sextus of violating the pact and attacked him again, only to be defeated in naval battles off Cumae and Messana. Unfortunately for Sextus, fortune turned against him in 36 BC, when a successful invasion of Sicily was mounted by Lepidus and Octavian's general, Marcus Agrippa inflicted a great defeat on his fleet at the Battle of Naulochos. Sextus fled to Asia with a remnant of his former navy, but he was forced to surrender and handed over for execution. This denarius is usually thought to have been struck at the height of Sextus Pompey's power, before the Pact of Misenum, due to the use of the titulature granted to him by the Senate in 43 BC. However, the types, which strongly refer to the Strait of Messina, may perhaps point to production in 38 BC to celebrate Sextus' victory there over Octavian. None of Sextus' coins actually give him another title superior to praefectus classis et orae maritimae. Whatever the case, the Messinian emphasis of this issue is unmistakable. The obverse depicts the pharos, or lighthouse of Messina, built to guide ships through the dangerous waters between Italy and Sicily, while the reverse depicts Scylla, the sea monster composed of a female body terminating in the tail of a sea monster and the heads of braying hounds that was believed to inhabit the Strait. She famously attempted to destroy the ships of the heroes Odysseus and Aeneas with the assistance of the monster Charybdis, who lived across the Strait from Scylla. The representation of Scylla on the denarius shows her violently attacking with an oar, which would be a most appropriate allegory for Sextus' defeat of Octavian's naval forces

The rare denarius coinage naming the moneyer M. Arrius Secundus and struck in 41 BC is generally believed to depict Q. Arrius, the hypothetical father of the obscure M. Arrius Secundus. Q. Arrius had served as a praetor during the Servile War (73-71 BC) fought against Spartacus and his army of escaped gladiators and slaves. Although the war involved a number of serious Roman setbacks, in 72 BC, Q. Arrius achieved victory over Spartacus' lieutenant Crixus by throwing one of the legionary standards into the midst of the enemy, thereby forcing his men to fight with their great ferocity to gain it back. The loss of a standard to the enemy was one of the greatest shames that a legion could suffer. This identification of the portrait seems assured in light of an extremely rare denarius pairing the same portrait with a reverse depiction of a soldier grasping a standard carried by another behind him. The reverse type depicts the dona militaria, or "military gifts" that were customarily awarded for exemplary service on the battlefield. In the centre appears the hasta pura (literally, "unstained spear") presented for killing an enemy in single combat, flanked by the laurel crown of victory and a rectangular phalera, a metal ornament usually worn on the breastplate in a manner similar to modern military medals of distinction. It has been noted that the portrait of Q. Arrius with its thin beard bears more than a passing resemblance to Octavian. It may perhaps have been intended to be read this way by those loyal to Octavian while still providing deniability for M. Arrius Secundus at a time when it remained unclear who would be the real master of Rome. This coin was struck while the Perusine War (41-40 BC) raged between Octavian and Mark Antony's wife and brother, Fulvia and Lucius Antony and its resolution still remained to be seen.

L. Servius Rufus was a colleague of M. Arrius Secundus among the tresviri monetales of 41 BC and like Secundus also produced a denarius coinage that also features a portrait seemingly intended to have multiple interpretations. The bearded portrait is often assumed to represent Servius Sulpicius Rufus, a distinguished Roman jurist taught by Cicero who died in 43 BC, two years before this coin was struck. At the same time, it looks suspiciously like a portrait of the living Marcus Brutus, potentially betraying L. Servius Rufus as a believer in the cause of the Liberators and a restored Republic. By encircling the portrait with his name, rather than that of Brutus, the moneyer has made it possible to argue that his intentions were not political, but that the similarity to other unambiguous images of the tyrannicide was entirely coincidental. The depiction of the two Dioscuri, Castor and Pollux, on the reverse relates the denarius to an aureus issue of L. Servius Rufus that features the heads of the Dioscuri on the obverse. In both cases these saviour gods refer to the legendary Battle of Lake Regillus (496 BC), at which the Romans were victorious over a great Latin army and the returning Etruscan king L. Tarquinius Superbus. This battle marked the final end to the threat of kings to the young Roman Republic-interestingly the same result desired by Brutus and his colleagues when they killed Caesar. During the Battle of Lake Regillus, the Dioscuri miraculously appeared as two horsemen on the field and guaranteed the Roman victory. In the aftermath of the battle, a temple was dedicated to the Dioscuri in the Roman Forum.

A great many coins were struck for Marcus Antonius, and if anything they prove he was not selfish on this account. He allowed, for example, his naval commander Gnaeus Domitius Ahenobarbus to strike some highly personalised types, and he struck coins with portraits of Divus Julius Caesar, Octavian, the triumvir Lepidus, his youngest brother Lucius Antonius, his son Marc Antony Jr. and three of his four wives, Octavia, Fulvia and Cleopatra VII. After Brutus and Cassius were defeated at Philippi in October, 42 B.C., Ahenobarbus patrolled the seas until 40 B.C., when the political tide shifted and he allied himself with Marc Antony just when war between Antony and Octavian seemed imminent. Ahenobarbus proved a staunch ally, patrolling the Adriatic and the Ionian seas and aiding in a variety of efforts, including an attempt to defeat Sextus Pompey. The Treaty of Brundisium restored peace, Ahenobarbus was made governor of Bithynia and then witnessed Antony's disastrous campaign against the Parthians in 36 B.C., and in the following year helped capture the renegade Sextus Pompey. Having thus far survived the civil war, Ahenobarbus temporarily abandoned his naval duties to reside in Rome in 32 B.C. as one of the two consuls for the year. Since his colleague in the consulship, Sosius, was also an ally of Antony, they worked hard to censure Octavian. This backfired, though, and Octavian responded by occupying Rome and causing the two consuls and some 300 pro-Antony senators to seek asylum with Antony in Asia Minor. Ahenobarbus remained loyal to Antony until the bitter end, at which point, just before the battle of Actium took place on September 2, 31 B.C, when Ahenobarbus' health was suffering and he was not enthusiastic about throwing his lot in with Cleopatra, he defected to Octavian. He did not long survive, dying of natural causes late in 31, or early in 30 B.C. On this denarius the obverse is dedicated to Antony and the reverse is dedicated to Ahenobarbus. The reverse of this denarius, which bears a prow with a star above, is an obvious reflection of his status as a naval commander. It is of some interest that his design served as the prototype for coinages struck by the Flavians more than a century later.

In 40 B.C., when this denarius is thought to have been struck, the conflict between Octavian and Marc Antony reached a new peak and found an uneasy resolution in the Pact of Brundisium. Octavian had returned from the Battle of Philippi with the hard task of settling some 40,000 veterans on their promised lands. As Octavian acquired land in Italy by force, his popularity was threatened. While Antony was away in the East, his wife Fulvia and brother Lucius Antonius preyed upon Octavian's misfortune by harassing him with political attacks that stirred the veterans of Antony against those of Octavian. Lucius gathered his brother's veterans and gained permission to wage war on Octavian, who was able to intercept Lucius' northward trek and force him to take refuge in Perusia. The Perusine War (41-40 B.C.), which had all of the potential to become a new civil war, was reduced to a brief event when the threat of starvation caused Lucius to surrender in February of 40 B.C. Though Octavian took revenge upon the Perusians, he took no direct action against Lucius or Fulvia. Indeed, he pardoned Lucius and soon assigned him to a promagistracy in Spain, where he died soon thereafter. Fulvia also died in the aftermath of the war. The siege in Perusia, the deaths of his brother and wife, and perhaps more importantly, Octavian's assumption of power in Gaul upon the death of Antony's governor there, alarmed Antony, who sailed West in October of that year. Upon arriving at the port of Brundisium in the spring of 40 B.C., Antony was refused entry to the harbour by Octavian's commander. Antony responded by besieging Brundisium and strengthening his ties with Sextus Pompey, Octavian's nemesis in the West. Hoping for damage control, Octavian hastily divorced his wife Claudia, married Sextus Pompey's sister-in-law, and led an army to the southern port. Fortunately for Rome, cool heads prevailed, and the triumvirs ironed out their differences. The resulting pact confirmed Antony's control of the East and Octavian's control of the West, and bound the men through the ultimately incendiary marriage of Antony and Octavian's sister, Octavia. The two men were now able to focus on their regional goals: Antony received legions from Octavian for his planned invasion of Parthia, and Octavian received war vessels from Antony to use against Sextus Pompey. This denarius of the moneyer Q. Voconius Vitulus was struck in the midst of these alarming events. The portraits of Octavian and the deified Julius Caesar on Voconius' coinage demonstrate his allegiance to Octavian, and though the inscriptions on his coins tout his status as quaestor designate, nothing further is known of his career or fate. Some of his issues – including the denarius offered here – show a lituus beside the portrait, an indication that both Caesar and Octavian had held the augurship. The reverse type of a standing calf is strictly personal, being a punning allusion to the cognomen Vitulus, which means calf.

After the assassination of Julius Caesar on the Ides of March 44 BC, his former lieutenant, Mark Antony, became the de facto leader of the Caesarean faction in Rome. Unfortunately, Caesar's will named his adoptive great-nephew Octavian as his heir, forcing Antony to fight against him for much of the remainder of 44 and 43 BC. However, in May 43 BC, Octavian began to negotiate an end to the conflict in order to join forces against the threat posted to both of them by the formation of large armies under the command of the Liberatores in the East. Despite their deep differences, in November, Antony, Octavian, and Marcus Lepidus met to form the Second Triumvirate and raise the armies that defeated the Liberators at the Battle of Philippi (3 and 23 October 42 BC). In the aftermath of this great victory, in order to keep peace, the empire was divided, with Octavian taking Italy and the West, Lepidus North Africa, and Antony the East. In 37 BC, the division of the empire and the Triumvirate was renewed among the three mend for another five years, but by this time the old animosity between Antony and Octavian was returning and it would not be long before it would break out into an epoch-ending war in 32-31 BC. This denarius was struck in the year of the renewed Triumvirate, probably in the context of Antony's work to restore order in Syria and the eastern provinces following a Parthian invasion in 40 BC. This was followed up by a somewhat ineffective campaign against the Parthians in 36. The precise occasion for this issue appears to have been the repression of Antiochus I of Commagene, who previously rebelled against Roman authority during the Parthian invasion. The reverse type depicting a trophy and advertising Antony's third acclamation as imperator is thought to refer to his taking personal command of the siege of Samosata, which the general P. Ventidius was already successfully prosecuting against Antiochus I. Although the king offered to surrender, Antony would not provide him with terms until he could arrive and take over the siege himself, thereby allowing him to claim the glory. Antony reportedly gave peace terms to Antiochos I that included an indemnity of 300 talents of silver, although when facing Ventidius he had offered to pay 1,000 to have the siege lifted. Antony then returned Ventidius to Rome, where he celebrated the first ever Roman triumph over the Parthians. Antony's claim of a third imperatorial acclamation on this coin is believed to derive from Ventidius' triumph and does not truly reflect an acclamation properly earned by the triumvir. It has been noted that the trophy reverse type seems to echo the types used on the Asian coinage of Brutus issued four years earlier, but it seems a little out of place for Antony's Parthian war context. The arms displayed are not particularly Parthian and the figure-eight shield is decidedly archaic in flavour. Likewise, the prow at the foot of the trophy is rather unexpected since sea power had virtually no involvement in the Parthian campaign. It has been suggested that the prow, which sometimes appears as part of Brutus' trophy type, might have been added to generally emphasise the superiority of Antony's naval strength at a time when his rival, Octavian, was weak at sea. Likewise, the possibility has been raised that the general similarity to Brutus' trophy might reflect regret on the part of Antony as he drifted ever closer to the final conflict with Octavian





The reign of Augustus marked the end of decades of civil war that had been tearing the Roman Republic apart since the early first century BC, the stabilisation of the borders of the Empire, and the institution of the so-called Pax Romana. All of this came at a high cost in Roman constitutional terms. All real power became concentrated in the hands of one man, thereby killing the old Republic and essentially establishing Augustus as king-an institution hated by the Romans since the expulsion of Tarquinius Superbus in 509 BC. However, Augustus carefully crafted his regime to give the outward appearance that the Republic lived on in a modified form and that he was in fact nothing more than primus inter pares ("first among equals") or princeps ("first"). His many successes, which were trumpeted in the monumental Res Gestae, included the (negotiated) restoration of the Roman standards captured by the Parthians in 53 BC and the conquest of Noricum and Raetia, and an extensive building program that is said to have taken the brick city of Rome and made it into a glorious city of marble. However, the disastrous defeat of the Roman legions against the Germanic tribesmen at the Teutoburg Forest in AD 9, convinced Augustus that it was necessary to end imperial expansion and consolidate the borders of the Empire. He also suffered numerous setbacks in attempting to establish an heir. Both his long-time colleague M. Agrippa, and his grandsons, Lucius and Gaius Caesar—his respective first and second choices as successors—died too soon, leaving Augustus no other option but to name his third choice, his stepson Tiberius, as his heir in AD 4. Even then, Augustus lived on to guide and develop the principate that he created for another decade before he died as a result of chronic illness or a poisoned fig supplied by his wife, Livia. The reverse type of this denarius celebrates the foundation of the Roman colony of Augusta Emerita in the province of Lusitania in 25 BC. This colony was used to settle veterans of legio V Alaudae, legio X Gemina, and possibly legio X Valeria Victrix who were due to retire from active duty and who had served in the Cantabrian Wars (29-19 BC). Victory in these conflicts marked the end of the two-centuries long Roman conquest of Spain. Augusta Emerita grew to become one of the largest cities of Roman Spain and was established as the administrative capital of Lusitania. The walls of the city are depicted on the reverse with a surrounding legend naming P. Carisius, the legatus Augusti pro praetore in Spain, who led the legions to victory against the Asturians in 25 BC before settling veterans at Augusta Emerita.

This denarius is thought to be another issue struck at the colonial mint of Caesar Augusta in Spain. As on the preceding piece, the emperor is depicted wearing the corona civica on the obverse and named in the legend as Caesar Augustus. The reverse, however is a spectacular type that celebrates the original source of the emperor's power, while he was still known as Octavian and before the settlement of 27 BC made him Augustus. The large star with a clear tail depicted on the reverse represents the famous sidus Iulium (literally the "star of Julius")—a great comet that appeared in the sky for seven days in July 44 BC as Octavian was celebrating the ludi Victoriae Caesaris, games instituted at Rome to celebrate the many victories of Julius Caesar. Although Caesar had been assassinated several months earlier, on the Ides of March, as his adoptive heir Octavian held the games as an act of filial piety and as a means of galvanising support against the Liberators. The timing of the comet could not have been better. Octavian immediately seized upon the celestial event and declared it to be the spirit of the dead Caesar ascending to the heavens. Thus, Caesar had clearly risen to the ranks of the gods, as indicated by the legend of this coin, which identifies the star as the Divine Julius. Thenceforth, Octavian bolstered his political position by not only presenting himself as the son of Caesar, the great man, but as the son of Caesar the god. This transition of Julius Caesar from murdered dynast to god was celebrated by the disgraced Augustan poet Ovid, who included the sidus Iulium in his Metamorphoses. In his account "... kindly Venus, although seen by none, stood in the middle of the Senate-house, and caught from the dying limbs and trunk of her own Caesar his departing soul. She did not give it time so that it could dissolve in air, but bore it quickly up, toward all the stars of heaven; and on the way, she saw it gleam and blaze and set it free. Above the moon it mounted into heaven, leaving behind a long and fiery trail, and as a star it glittered in the sky."

Although this denarius is thought to have been struck at a Spanish mint, its types advertise honours voted to Augustus for his extensive work to repair and improve the network of roads used to control the vast Roman Empire. It was through the road system that the imperial centre at Rome could maintain its communications with the provinces and quickly dispatch the legions to trouble spots. Amid the civil wars of the first century BC, many of the roads had fallen into disrepair and Augustus took it upon himself to correct the situation. Under the Republic, the responsibility for the upkeep of roads fell on two groups of minor magistrates, the quattuorviri, four men responsible for the roads in the city of Rome, and the duoviri, two men responsible for the roads outside of Rome. Unhappy with the work of the duoviri, Augustus abolished their office of the duoviri and assumed authority as commissioner of roads at his own personal expense. The present coin celebrates the conclusion of his restoration work on the Via Flaminia, one of the most important roads in Italy. This road linked Rome to Arminium (modern Rimini) and to other riverine and road networks. At each end of the completed road, a triumphal arch was constructed at each end to advertise great work and outlay of funds that had been involved. It is not clear whether the triumphal arch depicted on the reverse of this coin represents one of the actual arches constructed at the termini of the via Flaminia or if it is only an imagined arch serving as an allegory for the "triumph" of completing the road restoration, as is sometimes suggested. Since this coin was probably struck at a Spanish mint, it is not clear that the engraver would have ever seen either of the arches for the via Flaminia, although he was obviously aware that the road had arches and a dedication honouring the emperor for his road work.

This denarius was struck in the years of uncertainty between Octavian's defeat of Mark Antony and Cleopatra at the battle of Actium (31 BC), which made him sole master of the Roman Empire, and 27 BC, when he assumed the title and broad constitutional powers of Augustus, thereby becoming the first Roman Emperor. This was a dangerous period for both Octavian and Rome. Although his sheer military power made him the unquestionable ruler, to avoid the outbreak of a new round of civil wars, Octavian needed to carefully avoid the appearance of monarchy. To this end, he courted the Senate and public opinion to incrementally increase his authority through constitutional means. Despite his immense power, the obverse type seems to cast Octavian as just another magistrate of the Roman Republic. The portrait eschews any kind of ornamentation and there is no sign of the victor's laurel wreath or other headgear. Instead, he appears modestly bare headed as was generally expected of a respectable Roman citizen. The reverse type, however, provides the reason why both the Senate and People of Rome should honour the man portrayed on the obverse: through his victory at Actium he had allowed Pax, the Roman personification of Peace, to return after long years of ruinous civil war. Indeed, in 29 BC, he made a great show of the return of peace by personally closing the doors of the Temple of Janus. The short and simple message of this coin that must have been easily digestible by any Roman was that Octavian was a peace-bringer. That the message was clearly understood and accepted is indicated by the fact that when Octavian assumed full power as Augustus in 27 BC, the Senate awarded him the corona civica in recognition that he had saved the whole Roman people from civil war. However, at the same time the types of this denarius work to mould the public perception of Octavian in a post-civil war world, the old propaganda of the civil wars still lingers on in the legend, which names the issuer as Caesar, son of the god (i.e., Divus Julius).

Egypt would play a surprising role in the imperatorial period throughout much of the civil war. Having been under Ptolemaic rule since the death of Alexander the Great it would come down to the manipulative Cleopatra VII to try and save her dynasty. Shown on coinage not to be the great beauty that has been portrayed in film she was rather a master at playing her odds to maximum success. And Egypt itself would be: the scene of the first romance between Caesar and Cleopatra; the site of the killing of Pompey the Great; the place where Cleopatra captivated Marc Antony and showed him "how to live as a king"; and it would be the place where Antony and Cleopatra would finally die. Cleopatra had seduced Julius Caesar and managed to secure her right to rule with his support when he settled the dispute with her young brother Ptolemy XIII. She was staying in Rome as a "guest" of Caesar at the time of his assassination. She was able to return to Egypt and watch things play out between the successors of Caesar and the last loyalists to the republican cause. When it became clear that the Caesareans would win she formed an allegiance with Marc Antony. It must have seemed a fortuitous move on her part when Antony divorced Octavia and wed her. Surely if Antony could maintain his power she would continue to rule Egypt unimpeded. She had placed great reliance on this relationship by supplying Antony with both funds and ammunition that he needed to declare war on Antony and, in the process, gain the blessing of the Roman senate. Overtly, war was declared on Cleopatra - not Antony. It came to the point where she could now see what a great risk she had taken. Her only hope was that Antony would prevail and her dynasty would be preserved. The battle of Actium would prove to be the turning point in the battle between the two triumvirs. Antony was significantly supported in this battle by ships supplied by the queen and when the battle was lost so, in turn, was any remaining hope that she had chosen the correct alliance. It is reported that in a last ditch effort she offered herself to Octavian with the hope that she could salvage Egypt. It was not to be and Cleopatra was eliminated and Egypt was lost. It is important to recognise that the new province of Egypt was not to be owned by Rome but to be the personal property of Octavian. The wealth of this territory would not fill the coffers at Rome but rather the pockets of the, soon to be, emperor himself. The role of Egypt as a major supplier of grain would increase with Roman control. It would become a key factor in managing the ever growing population of Rome itself. Here the coin says much but in a most interesting way. Egypt was indeed captured, but not for the empire. It was captured for Octavian. It had to be a most personal of coin types for the sole survivor of the civil war. The historical importance of this coin cannot be overstated.

This rare denarius illustrates not only Augustus' desire to present himself as the continuator of the Roman Republic, but also his wish to be seen as a benefactor to his. Although the traditional college of Roman moneyers—the tresviri monetales—ceased to exist by 39 BC due to civil war and the domination of the coinage by the members of the Second Triumvirate of Octavian, Mark Antony and Marcus Lepidus. However, in his efforts to restore an illusory Republican normalcy following his assumption of power as Augustus in 27 BC, Octavian briefly revived the college of moneyers, as indicated here by the obverse signed by L. Aquilius Florus, one of the moneyers for 19 BC. The obverse depiction of Sol wearing a radiate crown may perhaps subtly flatter Augustus for his universal rule, extending throughout the world like the rays of the sun, but most likely it reflects the return of the Republican tradition of moneyers employing types related to their ancestors. A very similar Sol had appeared on Republican denarii struck by Manius Aquilius almost a century earlier in 109-108 BC. Aquilius used the same obverse type for other coins struck for Augustus during his tenure as one of the tresviri monetales. The reverse type depicts a large modius (grain measure) in a chariot drawn by four horses and seems to refer to action taken by the emperor to improve the grain supply of Rome. Although he had personal reservations about maintaining a permanent annona (grain dole) distributed to the urban poor of Rome, in the interest of his public image and of stability in the imperial capital, he is known to have expanded the number of recipients from 150,000 to 200,000. In 23/2 BC, Augustus also took charge of the general grain supply to Rome during a period of shortage and at his personal expense ensured the provision of grain at reasonable prices. This successful intervention in the grain supply was considered by the emperor to be important enough to be trumpeted by Augustus in his Res Gestae. Both the Res Gestae and the coin type, however, fail to indicate that before action was taken the hungry people of Rome were rioting in the streets and threatening to burn down the Senate House if Augustus was not granted authority to intervene. The fact that he was able to resolve the shortage in a matter of days has led some commentators to suspect that the grain shortage was actually created by Augustus for the purpose of turning the people against the Senate and being seen as the hero to end the

This type showing the comet which appeared in the summer of 44 BC once again likely relates to the Ludi Saeculares (Secular Games). Where the earlier issues only showed the comet (as in lots 52 & 53), here the coin would also include what would prove to be the last image of the deified Julius Caesar who would not appear again until restoration issues more than a century later. Of interest here with the portrait of Caesar is that it no longer looks like earlier portraits but has taken on a strong resemblance to Augustus. There can be little doubt that this was an intentional effort by the engravers.

Like the preceding coin, this denarius was struck during the period of the restored tresviri monetales under Augustus, in this case by M. Sanquinius, one of the moneyers of 17 BC. In general, the coinages struck by Sanquinius celebrate the ludi Saeculari (Secular Games) held by Augustus in that year and this denarius is no exception. According to Roman Republican religious tradition, every 100 years, special games were to be held to mark the beginning of a new age (saeculum in Latin). In order to ensure that the prestigious ludi Saeculari fell during his reign, and particularly in the tenth year of his power as Augustus, the emperor ordered a consultation of the Sibylline Books. It was, rather unsurprisingly, reported back that an oracle in the books now required the games to be celebrated every 110 years, which made the year of Augustus' decannalia the correct one for celebrating the ludi Saeculares. The emperor dutifully put on a lavish series of games from 30 May to 3 June 17 BC that honoured all of the gods with special rites and included theatrical shows and chariot races. The reverse type depicts one of the heralds that were sent around Rome ahead of the games with orders to invite the people to "a spectacle, such as they had never witnessed before and never would again," according to the Greek historian Zosimus. He carries the caduceus as a sign of his office as herald as well as a shield emblazoned with a star, perhaps representing the dawn of the new age. This star is almost certainly to be connected with the sidus Iulium that appears above the portrait head on the obverse of the coin. The rejuvenated character of the portrait has led to disagreement over whether it is intended to represent Augustus or Julius Caesar, but the sidus Iulium seems to make a strong case for Caesar as Divus Iulius. Indeed, his assassination and supposed ascent to the gods really did mark the beginning of a new age for Rome and the empire.

An important feature of the Augustan political program was to give the impression that while Augustus had assumed full power over the Roman state, the Republic still lived on. This illusion was important to avoid the fate suffered by Julius Caesar when he brazenly took up the trappings of kingship. As a means of propping up the Republican image, Augustus resurrected old Roman religious traditions and magistracies that had fallen into disuse during the civil wars of the first century BC. This denarius firmly belongs to the Augustan Republican illusion through several notable features. Whereas earlier denarii had emphasised the emperor's unique qualities and powers by depicting him wearing the corona civica granted to him by the Senate in 27 BC, here the portrait of Augustus is shown bare headed in conformity with old Republican custom, as if to emphasise his disingenuous claim to be merely primus inter pares, "first among equals." Likewise, the reverse illustrates Augustus' revival of the Republican office of moneyer. The surrounding legend names C. Sulpicius Platorinus as the moneyer responsible for the issue. However, at the same time that the coin is imbued with these pseudo-Republican qualities, the reverse type is decidedly monarchical in character. It depicts Augustus and Marcus Agrippa seated side by side to illustrate their equal status and mark out the latter as the intended heir of Augustus. Under the constitutional settlement of 23 BC, Augustus had established Agrippa as his intended heir, granting him proconsular imperium in imperial provinces and arranging a marriage to Augustus' daughter Julia the Elder. In 18 BC, a few years before this coin was struck, Agrippa's powers were made virtually equivalent to those of Augustus by a grant of tribunicia potestas and imperium in all provinces of the empire. Unfortunately, despite all of this, Agrippa died in 12 BC, the year after this coin was issued, thereby frustrating all of Augustus' carefully devised plans for a smooth succession and forcing him to seek new suitable heirs.

Of all the coinages honouring Agrippa, this denarius is perhaps the most interesting, not only because it represents what Augustus hoped would be his final dynastic settlement, but because Agrippa wears a composite crown with towered embattlements and ship's prows to commemorate his many victories at land and at sea. Indeed, when this denarius was issued in 12 B.C., the aspirations of Marcus Agrippa appeared limitless: he was a proven, loyal friend to Augustus, was husband to the emperor's only child, and was the father of the emperor's two grandsons. The joint renewal of the tribunician power for Augustus and Agrippa – the basis for this 'dynastic' coinage – was not awarded lightly, as it announced to all that Augustus' heir was none other than Agrippa.

All of the coins which Claudius struck for his deceased mother Antonia honour her as Augusta, a status she shared only with Livia. We are told by Suetonius (Gaius 15) that Caligula compelled the senate to grant Antonia every honour possessed by Livia. However, the same historian (Claudius 11) tells us she refused what Caligula proposed and that only after her death was she hailed Augusta by Claudius. (It is worth noting that an inscription from Corinth indicates she was hailed Augusta by Caligula.). Antonia's portrait on the obverse of her two precious metal coinages represent her in the guise of Ceres (Demeter), for she wears a crown of grain ears. The reverse type of this denarius is inscribed SACERDOS DIVI AVGVSTI, and depicts two alight torches linked by a ribbon or garland. The inscription is a direct reference to Claudius – the issuer of the coin – as the priest of the cult of Divus Augustus. The meaning of the two torches is less clear. Perhaps they signify Livia and Antonia as the only two women, both deceased, who held the title Augusta. Alternatively, they may represent the rites of the Augustan priesthood, of which Antonia was named priestess under Caligula, and Claudius since the accession of Tiberius. Equally likely is the possibility of the explanation involving the Ceres-Demeter connection already noted for the obverse. Demeter is usually depicted holding a torch, which illuminated her visits to the underworld. The worship of Ceres-Demeter in Rome involved annual celebrations (the Cerealia) and games (the Ludi Cereales). The cult was ancient and important, and was inextricably tied to the Eleusinian Mysteries. Claudius' interest in its occult rituals must have been deep since Suetonius (Claudius 25) tells us he tried to relocate the Eleusinian Mysteries from Attica to Rome.

When Caligula became emperor he did so as the lone-surviving male of the lines of Augustus and Germanicus; though his three sisters were still alive, he had lost both parents and both brothers during the reign of Tiberius. His father had died under mysterious circumstances and the rest fell during the family's contest for power against Tiberius and his prefect Sejanus. Since Caligula's claim to power rested upon his membership in the Julio-Claudian family, early in his reign he tried to curry favour by taking a journey to the islands of Potnia and Pandateria to gather the ashes of his mother Agrippina and his eldest brother Nero Caesar. (His brother Drusus Caesar died of starvation in prison, and none of his remains survived.) The seas were stormy, and the perilous nature of his journey only amplified the appearance of Caligula's devotion to the memory of his family. As part of this programme of honouring his ill-fated relatives, Caligula issued this denarius with the portrait of his mother, who for the decade after Germanicus' death had been Tiberius' greatest critic, and his most persistent opponent. On this denarius her facial features are similar to those of Caligula – a feature that seems to combine family resemblance and a programmatic desire to show the kinship between the new emperor and his mother.

By the time the emperor Claudius came to the throne after the murder of his depraved nephew Caligula, he been properly schooled in how terribly people can treat one another. Indeed, it was his enduring, impotent position in the eye of the Julio-Claudian storm that made him the central character in Robert Graves' classic work of historical fiction, I, Claudius, As a child he could not benefit from his father, who died before he reached his first year, and he apparently suffered a lack of love from his mother, the otherwise admirable Antonia, who, according to Suetonius (Claudius 3) described him as "a monster: a man whom nature had not finished but had merely begun". In the bigger picture, Claudius' physical disabilities served him well, for he survived the treacherous reigns of Tiberius and Caligula (though not unscathed, for he suffered through the aftermath of many deplorable acts). His 13-year reign was entirely unexpected. In one of Tacitus' most memorable and personal passages, he states about Claudius: "The more I think about history, ancient or modern, the more ironical all human affairs seem. In public opinion, expectation, and esteem no one appeared a less likely candidate for the throne than the man for whom destiny was secretly reserving it." For most Romans, Claudius' reign was a pleasant departure from the more oppressive reigns of Tiberius and Caligula, both of whom were generally disliked. Claudius seems to have been popular with the people and often with the army, but he usually was at odds with the senate, from whom he demanded hard work and dedication. The use of Constantia on the reverse of this denarius likely represents her virtue of courage. Certainly given his upbringing no one could claim more courage than Claudius. This type also appears in some quantity on aurei and may be more common in that metal than in silver. There was finally a rather large minting of Constantia types in bronze. This type would be used for the entire reign and was clearly an important symbol of the life of Claudius.

This double portrait denarius, struck in the four years before the death of Claudius illustrates the importance of his fourth wife, Agrippina the Younger. Suetonius and other sources claim that the emperor had a weakness for his wives, and indeed, following the public scandal and shame brought upon him by his third wife Messalina in 48, he was quick to find a fourth. In 49, he married his niece Agrippina the Younger for strongly political reasons. As she was the great-granddaughter of Augustus and a daughter of Claudius' brother, the celebrated general Germanicus, it was hoped by both the emperor and the Senate that the marriage would end the feud between Julian and Claudian branches of the imperial dynasty that had been going on since the death of Germanicus in 19. However, the marriage was very problematic. Not only was it disapproved by much of Roman society—the family relationship between Claudius and Agrippina made it immoral in Roman custom—Claudius had Britannicus, a son from his marriage to Messalina whom he saw as his successor while Agrippina had Nero, a son from her previous marriage to Cn. Domitius Ahenobarbus, whom she wished to become Claudius' heir. Almost as soon as Agrippina became empress, she began working on the advancement of her son. She first eliminated any individuals in the imperial court who seemed loyal to the memory of Messalina and then set about gaining influence with Claudius' chief secretary, doctor, and with the praetorian prefect. Thus, she was able to control the imperial palace and increasingly her husband. Her power only increased in 50, when Claudius granted her the honour of the title Augusta. While this title became commonplace for empresses later in imperial history, at the time this was a very special honour—only Livia, the wife of Augustus, had previously received this title. It had also been granted to Antonia the Younger by her grandson Caligula, but she refused to accept. The present coin, which employs the title of Augusta on the reverse, is very likely to have been struck and possibly distributed as largesse on the occasion of Agrippina's assumption of the title. At the same time that Agrippina became Augusta, a position that gave her even greater influence over Claudius and expanded her powers in the imperial administration, Nero was also adopted by Claudius as a second son alongside Britannicus. In the following year, Agrippina worked to isolate Britannicus from his father and convinced Claudius to recognise Nero as his heir. To this end, she arranged a marriage between her son and Claudia Octavia, the daughter of Claudius and Messalina in 53. All seemed to be going according to her plans when suddenly, in 54, Claudius had a change of heart and began preparing Britannicus to be his successor. Due to this unexpected development, Agrippina was widely suspected as a murderess when Claudius died on 13 October 54. Suetonius claims that the murder weapon was a poisoned plate of mushrooms. Regardless of what involvement she may or may not have had in the death of her husband, Claudius' will granting joint rule to Nero and Britannicus or sole rule to Britannicus was repressed and Nero succeeded him as emperor. The 13-year-old Britannicus was poisoned a year later to prevent him from posing a threat to Nero's reign. Agrippina had achieved her goal and her son was emperor. Unfortunately, her overbearing character and her desire to use the young Nero as a tool for her own ambitions finally led to her murder in 59.

Coinage in the name of Domitilla has long been a source of confusion, for the denarii and aurei bear portraits with the designation DIVA, and the sestertii, which are dated to the sole reign of Titus, have no portrait and no indication that the lady they honour was deified. The obvious conclusion is that they are separate coinages that presumably honour different women. Fortunately two candidates are known, Vespasian's wife Flavia Domitilla and their daughter, who bore the same name. Both women died before Vespasian became emperor in 69, an appropriate circumstance for the memorial in nature of these coinages. Titus sestertii for his mother, the elder Domitilla, are inscribed MEMORIAE DOMITILLAE SPQR and show a carpentum drawn by mules. Metrological study by Carradice has shown that the aurei and denarii of the deified Domitilla were struck by Domitian sometime after his monetary reform of 82. This conclusion is reinforced by their portraits, which incorporate the features of Domitian (as can clearly be observed on the coin offered here). Despite having died before her family came to rule the empire, the younger Domitilla had at least one daughter who, rather inconveniently, bore the same name as her mother and grandmother, and who is thus called Domitilla III. This young woman eventually married Flavius Clemens, a grandson of Vespasian's brother Flavius Sabinus. The royal couple had several children of their own, though coins were struck for only one of them, the unfortunate Vespasian Junior, who eventually was murdered by Domitian

Historians disagree about the date of Marciana's death: some place it in 105, the year that she and Plotina jointly took the title of Augusta, while others suggest a date as late as 112 or 114. One of the two later dates seems more likely. This posthumous coinage does represent a novelty in Roman numismatics, for the word consecratio first appears here, and thereafter was employed frequently for posthumous coinages. Following Marciana's death, her daughter Matidia was raised to the rank of Augusta, and coinage was struck in her name in addition to that already being struck in the name of Trajan's wife, Plotina.



In the confusion that followed the assassination of Pertinax, the praetorian guard held a scandalous spectacle: an auction for the emperorship. There was spirited bidding between Flavius Sulpicianus, the father-in-law of the murdered Pertinax, and the senator Didius Julianus, one of the wealthiest men in Rome. When Julianus pledged an accession bonus of 25,000 sestertii per guard, it was a bid that Sulpicianus could not top. The praetorians led Julianus before the terrified Senate, which had no choice but to ratify the coup d'état. The people of Rome, however, were disgusted by this shameful turn of events and sent messengers to seek help from the commanders of the legions in the provinces. Three generals responded and marched on Rome. Septimius Severus, being the closest to Rome, had the upper hand. The praetorians were no match for the battle hardened soldiers from the frontier, and they quickly decided in favour of Severus. Didius Julianus was not so fortunate, as he was captured at the beginning of June and beheaded in the manner of a common criminal.

Masterfully suited to the purposes of a dynastic coinage, this aureus is inscribed AETERNIT IMPERI, "the eternity of the empire," which equates the continuity of the empire with the continuity of the Severan dynasty. The positioning of the portraits is just as would be expected: the father and senior emperor Septimius Severus occupies the position of honour on the obverse and his two sons occupy the reverse, with the elder, Caracalla, on the left wearing a laurel wreath to indicate his status as junior Augustus, and the younger, Geta, bare-headed on the right to denote his lesser status as Caesar. Although the brothers were relatively close in age, Caracalla had been hailed Augustus in 198 and Geta remained Caesar until 209. The explanation for this gap may never be known, but we may be sure it aggravated the rivalry that already existed between the siblings. As time passed each brother attracted his own faction of supporters in Rome and throughout the empire, and after Caracalla murdered Geta he wasted no time in tracking down and murdering a great many people who had been loyal to Geta.
